

OPA PLEDGES NEW CLOTHING PRICE SLASH

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24 (AP)—The OPA today promised more cuts in the price of clothing and more lower-priced garments on dealers' shelves.

The new, twin assault on inflated clothing prices will be foisted by the Price Administrator Chester B. Bowles said, by clamping down on the price ceilings of garment makers and tightening retail price rules governing retail sales.

As the whole program takes effect, any increases in the cost of living index in the coming months will stop completely, Bowles predicted.

The OPA thus evidently pinned its entire hope of carrying out its introduction of Economic Stabilization Director Fred M. Vinson who asserted that a "disturbing" climb in retail costs "must stop."

Vinson's instructions were construed as a tip-off to an administration decision not to drop the "Little Green" pay formula before Germany's collapse, but to give labor unions assurance that the cost of living would not climb while they stood still.

OPA's opening moves to make good the Vinson pledge were announced last night. They are: First, a decision to set dollar-a-week retail prices, which will appear on easy-to-read tickets on each garment, on the 30,000 items of children's clothing for which the war production board has made a special allotment of material this quarter.

Second, an order intended to "fancy-up" and "over-haul" simple materials, which rich houses estimated may save consumers as much as \$60,000 a year. This is to be done by reducing the margins of textile finishers.

PREVENTION OF WPA HOPED FOR BY MOTT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24 (AP)—Hope that the pending post-war highway bill will prevent "any WPA road building," is expressed by Representative Mott (R-Ore.), ranking republican member of the house roads committee.

Mott told a reporter that "We'll get a pretty good bill out of conference," though he expressed regret that the total amount to be made available is not larger.

Highway legislation passed by the senate provides a total of \$1,350,000,000 for a three-year period. The house bill calls for \$1,500,000,000. Mott said he proposed an amendment to the house bill adding \$250,000,000 this week. "Just to test the sentiment of the committee," but found the majority determined on the billion-and-a-half figure.
