

Medford Whips Gresham; Tigers Thump Roosevelt

Powerful T-Formation Elevens Clash At Portland December 2 For Crown

Medford's Black Tornado from the eastern end of the state—two T-powered, high-speed elevens—will collide in Portland's Multnomah on Saturday afternoon, December 2, for Oregon's 1944 gridiron crown.

They saw to it that in semi-final games yesterday (Thanks to Medford's huge red and black machine edging out Gresham's Gophers, 6 to 0 at Gresham, and La Grande's Blue and white loop champs availing themselves of Portland by a 33 to 7, at La Grande, Medford, now unstopped in straight tilts, struck like lightning in the fourth period of the game's only score. Glen

Bostwick, racehorse left half-back, broke loose for 53 yards on a quick-opening "T" play, and Fullback Marvin Doty followed with a wide sweep of 12 yards into the end zone. He scored standing up.

Gresham was outweighed some 20 pounds per man but made a real battle of it. Thrice the Gophers, led by Fred Owens, were inside Medford's 20, but they couldn't punch through the bulky Tornado line.

A Medford touchdown drive was halted on the four-yard line by the halftime gun, and on the three-yard stripe by the game's end. Medford rolled up 230 yards to 129, and had 11 first downs to 9.

The amazing Tigers, rated no better than an even choice against Roosevelt's Roughriders, Portland and district 4 champs, generated terrific heat to turn the contest into a rout.

The Eastern Oregonians struck for a touchdown seven minutes after the opening kickoff on a 65-yard forward pass play from Bob Carey to Jim Courtney, added another score in the second period, two more in the third and still another in the fourth.

Roosevelt, playing without the services of its star fullback, Dick Gray, injured in the Grant game two weeks ago, was able to tally only in the final stanza against La Grande second-stringers.

The game, played on a snow-covered gridiron, marked the 10th straight triumph for La Grande and established it as one of the finest teams ever developed in that part of Oregon.

University of Oregon, famous for its basketball from Madison Square garden to Hawaii, will play the Leatherneck cagers tonight at the Klamath Union high gym and Saturday night on the marine court.

Bob Hamilton, dynamic little guard from Seattle, is the only returning regular from last year's second place northern division, Pacific coast conference quintet. The remainder of the squad is an assortment of discharged war veterans, untried 4-F's, and two reserve lettermen.

Bouncing back after a double defeat at the hands of a strong coast guard aggregation from Seattle, the Webfoots rolled over the Willamette Navycats 55-35 and 69-49 with Bob Hamilton and his running mate, Dick Wilkins, pacing their attack. A fast breaking, spectacular and crowd-pleasing style of play.

The Webfoots will be facing a Leatherneck team in its initial effort. But Marine Coach Sergeant Les Israel has his boys primed and is confident that the Webfoots will meet a fighting team with plenty of scoring power in its own right.

The probable starting lineup Coach Israel announced will be John Cox and Southpaw Joe Domitrovich at the guards, Red Gilbert at the pivot post, and Leonard Burland and Bill Mills forwards. This combination gives the Leathernecks a team with plenty of height, averaging 6 feet, 1 inch.
