Foothold on the western end of the main Rhine bridge. Six German headquarters and reports that patrols had crossed the Rhine into Germany had been found to be without basis.

Near Junction

The Paris radio said French forces seeking to trap Germans in the Vosges mountains between Strasbourg and Colmar were only eight miles apart, but there was no confirmation.

Ninth army doughboys seized the Saar river line and two miles southwest of Julich. They knocked out seven more tanks yesterday, for a total in this offensive of 125—as many as most German armored divisions now have.

Planes also supported U. S. infantry battling northwest of Strasbourg against stern German opposition.

American case of the third army drove a new invasion spearhead into Germany five miles south of Metz, with an advance carrying a half-mile over the border.

The third army had crossed the Saar river at several points, moving up tanks in some of its river-spanning forces. A front dispatch declared the third army gained from two to four miles at points along a 80-mile front today, capturing at least 10 tanks.

stroyed by our bombers. Why are they fighting so desperately IN FRONT of the Rhine?

Only the Germans know, but one naturally suspects that their defenses behind the Rhine may not be as strong as we have been led to believe.

THE French are cleaning up the German 19th army in the far south. The Germans thus trapped west of the Rhine are getting across to the east bank as best they can with insufficient bridges.

Our high command says today that our patrols HAVEN'T yet crossed the river.

THE Russians take Hatvan and Miskolc in Hungary—two more stepping-stones toward Budapest. They're apparently starting in determinedly to wipe up the 300,000 Germans supposed to be trapped in Latvia.

That's a lot of Germans in the Russian rear. Obviously it wouldn't be wise to leave them there.

WE'RE inclined to wonder why the Russians don't hit East Prussia harder. This East Prussia country is a maze of marshes and lakes. The Russians, accepted as the world's most efficient WINTER fighters, may be waiting for the final freeze-up that will make the going easier in such country.

Revolt Problem For Teamsters

SEATTLE, Nov. 25 (AP)—The teamsters union (AFL) may decide today "how we shall deal with the leaders" of a rebellion in the Taxicab Drivers' union local 465, which caused a 36-hour tieup in cab service here a midweek, Gordon Lindsay of the Teamsters said.

The insurgents, at a meeting yesterday attended by more than 300 of Seattle's 800 drivers, made no motions toward assumption of the walkout but openly defied Teamster Leader Dave Beck by calling for an election of officers. Beck had appointed Lindsay acting trustee of the drivers' local pending investigation of the strike.

Riot Breaks Out in Brussels

BRUSSELS, Belgium, Nov. 25 (AP)—Shooting and widespread fighting broke out during a parade of demonstrators against the Hubert Pierlot government today and at least eight men were shot.

Among those injured were five demonstrators, two policemen and a Brussels policeman.

The shooting occurred in front of Premier Pierlot's office on the Rue de La Roi. The gravest of the fist-fighting also took place there.

Diphtheria Outbreak Controlled in North

JUNEAU, Alaska, Nov. 25 (AP)—An outbreak of diphtheria at Juneau and several outlying villages on the Seward peninsula has been brought under control, C. C. Carter, territorial health commissioner, reported today.

A travel quarantine, in effect since the cases first came to attention a month ago, has been lifted, he said.

Thirty-nine cases were reported, predominantly among Eskimo children. There were four deaths.

took up 640 acres three miles west of Bonanza on what is now the Dairy-Bonanza highway. He built a home of handmade shakes and lumber. This residence is now occupied by a son, Fred. Margaret Rueck died in 1917 at the age of 80.

On June 23, 1897, Michael Rueck and Emma Herter, a native of Baden, Germany, were married in Fort Wayne, Indiana. Mr. Rueck had gone to Indiana to visit a sister and his bride-to-be was visiting an aunt when they first met. She came to the United States in 1896.

Immediately after their marriage, Mr. and Mrs. Rueck started west and traveled over the old Ashland road to Linkville and continued on to Bonanza where neighbors made them welcome with gifts and food.

Four Children

Four children were born to the Ruecks, all of whom survive. They are Fred of Bonanza, Mrs. Lee (Margaret) Holliday, Klamath Falls, Mrs. Rollan (Annie) Meyers, and Mrs. James (Elsie) Luebke, both of Klamath Falls.

In his early years, Mr. Rueck was active in raising stock but with the coming of irrigation, changed over to diversified farming. His brother Jacob was instrumental in establishing the Klamath Irrigation project and the Horsefly district. He made several trips to Washington in behalf of these projects.

Survivors

Michael Rueck was held in high esteem by his neighbors. Few pioneers came to the Bonanza country who did not first come to Mr. Rueck for advice and assistance. He leaves his wife, four children, and a host of friends to mourn his passing.

Final rites will be held Tuesday at 2 p. m. from Ward's Funeral home chapel with the Rev. Frederick C. Wissenbach officiating. Interment will take place in the Bonanza cemetery.

Synthetic Oil Factory Pounded

LONDON, Nov. 25 (AP)—More than 1000 American heavy bombers accompanied by an equal number of fighter escorts bombed the Leuna synthetic oil refinery at Merseburg today—the second time in less than a week—with more than 3000 tons of explosives.

The big Flying Fortresses and Liberators were accompanied by more than 1000 Thunderbolts, Mustangs and Lightnings of both the U. S. eighth and ninth air force.

Patrols Reach Italian Town

ROME, Nov. 25 (AP)—Armored British patrols have reached a suburb of Faenza and have forced the Germans to withdraw from their positions along the Cosina river four miles southeast of the Bologna-Rimini highway town, allied headquarters announced today.

Fanning out from the Cosina river bridgehead, one British force cut to the northeast, put a block on highway 9 and pressed on, reaching Corleto.
