Greeks Mix Mythology, Science to Explain Sunrise

By J. HUGH PRUETT Astronomer, General Extension Division of Univ. of Ore. The rising of the brilliant planet Jupiter was to many ancient peoples the appearance of one of their glorious gods. To the poets of Greece, sunrise was the coming over the horizon of the resplendent sun-chariot which each day was drawn across the sky by the four galloping, fiery steeds driven by Apollo, god of light. But many ancient Greeks attempted really scientific explanations. Xenophanes, about 500 B. C. taught that sunrise was the appearance of a cloud set afire below the horizon in the dawn and finally blown into sight. Later, others believed that all the heavenly bodies were luminous objects set in an immense crystalline sphere which made a complete rotation once a day. Star-rise and sunrise occurred when these objects were brought above the rim of the flat earth. Copernicus' Theory Copernicus, around 1500 A. D., said the heavenly bodies rose in the east and crossed the sky from east to west because of the turning, not of the sky, but of the earth in the opposite direction. This is the present belief.
