WASHINGTON, Nov. 28 (A)—
The house committee investigating the federal communications commission voted today to close the hearings to the public, and Committee Counsel John J. Sirica immediately tendered his resignation.

The committee's decision, announced by Chairman Lea (D-Calif.) at the start of today's hearing, brought from Rep. Wiggleworth (R-Mass.), the assertion that the vote to terminate the "public hearings at this time may well create a national scandal."

In the course of its investigation, the committee has inquired into the sale of radio station WMCA. New York, to Edward J. Noble, former under secretary of commerce.

Witnesses have charged that Donald Flamm sold the station under "duress."

Sirica, who said he took the position as committee counsel "at great sacrifice" to himself, asserted:

There is great public interest "There is great public interes, in this case. I don't want it on my conscience that I submitted to a whitewash. Therefore, I am tendering to you my resignation, effective immediately."

"How anyone who has listened

"How anyone who has listened to the testimony during the last three days... can vote to close these hearings to the public at this time is beyond my comprehension...

"Ever since the start of this investigation, this committee and its staff has met with constant obstruction, intimidation and underhand tactics from those in high places in the attempt to hamstring its work and to suppress the truth."

Rep. Hart (D-N.J.) another committee member, responded that "all talk of intimidation of this committee is without foundation; all talk of suppression of fact is entirely without foundation."


