CITY LEAGUE SLATES MEET IN KLAMATH

City officials of Klamath and Lake counties, and civic leaders who are interested in post-war municipal programs, will meet at the Pelican cafe in Klamath Falls, 6:30 Friday evening, December 1. Invitations to attend the meeting, which is being sponsored by the League of Oregon Cities and the city of Klamath Falls, have been sent to the city officials of Bonanza, Chiloquin, Lakeview, Malin, Merrill, and Paisley by Mayor John H. Houston and League President Fred C. Inkster of Oswego.

Proposed federal and state legislation of particular interest to cities, postwar planning, and exchange of information on local municipal problems will feature the evening's program. Meeting with local officers: Mayor George P. Stadelman, The Dalles; Mayor O. L. Wood, Coquille; Mayor C. A. Meeker of Medford and Herman Kahrl, league executive secretary and director of the university's bureau of municipal research and service.

Local arrangements for the meeting have been made by Mayor John H. Houston and Police Judge H. T. Franey. Among the federal programs and policies scheduled for discussion are the two highway aid bills now pending in congress, federal surplus property bills as they relate to cities, and provisions of the war mobilization recovery act with reference to local planning, and proposed federal airport aid legislation. Proposals for the revision of the local budget law, for retirement legislation for public employees, planning controls in the suburban and metropolitan areas, and new revenue sources for cities will also be discussed.

"Every city, every community, must be prepared to assume its proper responsibilities in the

post-war period," said Inkster in issuing the call for the meeting. "It is futile to hope for a better world unless we can prepare for better communities right here at home. Now is the time for planning. Now is the time for engineering. Now is the time to plan financing. Now is the time to develop plans for coordinating local postwar programs with those of the state and federal government. In this effort the League of Oregon Cities seeks to be of assistance to every city and to every community to the end that local government will continue to make its maximum contribution to the democratic way of life."

Ex-Marine Held On Charges of Illegal Wearing of Uniform

BOSTON, Nov. 28 (AP)—A former marine who was alleged to have duped Canadian army officers into thinking he was aide to an American admiral today was held for federal grand jury action on charges of illegally wearing the uniform of a U. S. naval lieutenant and impersonation.

E. A. Soucy, agent in charge of the federal bureau of investigation in Boston, identified the man as Martin Edward Maher, 19, of Everett, Wash. Maher was arraigned yesterday before U. S. Commissioner Ballard F. Keith at Bangor, Me. He was unable to furnish bail of \$3500.

Soucy said Maher had been "posing as an aide to Admiral King at Chatham, New Brunswick, Canada, where he was the guest of an officers' mess at the Canadian army base."

PORTLAND, Nov. 28 (AP)—Oregon farm leaders and agricultural officials will meet here next Friday and Saturday with a Washington, D. C., delegation to plan the state's 1945 farm production schedule.

G. F. Geissler, director of the AAA western division, will head the government group and explain what the war food administration expects from Oregon's farms next year.

R. B. Taylor, Oregon AAA committee chairman, said the total farm goal will be about as high as this year, with increases wanted in some crops and decreases in others.
