### Navy Star May Be Out Of Big Tilt

Jenkins, Alabama Bomber, Has Foot Infection; Arky Aces All Ready to Travel

ANNAPOLIS, Md., Nov. 29 (AP)—There was doubt today whether Bobby Jenkins, the Alabama bomber, would overcome a foot infection in time to join the assault in Army's crucial games Saturday, but the Navy was certain two little fellows from Arkansas stood a pretty good chance of leaving the situation to victory.

Jenkins, the Alabamian ace power runner, is absent in the naval academy infirmary and now quickly an infection of his left foot will clear up remained uncertain. Based on the doctor's reports, Commander Oscar E. Rugeberg, head coach, expressed doubt that his leading ground gainer would see action. A definite decision was expected today.

However, the Navy physician caring for Jenkins said today that he was still uncertain, and probably would be able to say definitely tomorrow whether the Alabamian could play.

But, whether Jenkins is in there or not—the Middies were ready to throw Army's special nemesis, Little Hal Hamberg, the 150-pound dynamite package from Louke, at the Cadets for the third straight year; and with the assurance that he would be amply supported by Clyde Scott, the line smacker from, aptly enough, Smackover, Ark.

Operating behind the Sailors' great forward wall, Hamberg never looked better than when he ran and passed. Purdue's strong eleven into defeat, apparently fully recovered from a pulled leg muscle that had kept him inactive through four big mid-season games.

And, when you say that Hamberg never has shone more brilliantly, you're certain to draw a dirty look from Army, because he has been the special horn for the Cadets two straight years.

This time will be his last on a gridiron, since he has played four years — one at Arkansas university and two at Navy — capping his career by making the all-eastern eleven for the second straight year.

But Arkansas made certain of the headlines when Smack'em Scott came from Bullis Prep to make the fullback spot on the varsity as a Plebe this year. Weighing only 175 pounds, he gets terrific power and is plenty shifty and elusive. He is about tops on average gains per play for the Middies and is a terror on defense behind the line.

**Medford Team Leaves Wednesday For Title Tilt With La Grande**  
MEDFORD, Nov. 29 (AP)—Medford high's Black Tornado football squad, 27 strong, will leave here Wednesday night for Portland where it will battle the LaGrande Tigers Saturday afternoon for Oregon's 1944 prep gridiron championship. Coaches Al Simpson and Ed Kirtley will accompany the team.

The Tornado, undefeated and untied in nine tilts, will be at full strength for the title contest. Dean Sheldon, giant tackle and Fullback Marvin Doty, who were to have reported to the navy yesterday, will not be called until December 5, navy officials announced.

### Klamath Sweeps Triple-Header From Weak Opposition Tuesday

KUHS started the basketball season with a bang Tuesday night on the local court by sweeping three tilts from Chilcoot, Merrill and a Henley-Bonanza combination.

Seniors composed the quintet that battled Chilcoot in the initial fracas and, although the visitors jumped off to an early lead, they were soon overtaken and Klamath led 14-10 at the end of the half.

The local ads increased their advantage during the two final quarters and the game ended with the score 36-17. Gillette with seven markers was high point man for the K-men, closely followed by Perkins and Alexander with six each. Flury and Floyd accounted for five counters each for the visitors.

In the second tussle a five made up of Juniors ran wild over Merrill to the tune of 34-14. Merrill never had a ghost of a chance and was hopelessly outclassed all the way. The local boys held a 17-5 lead at the halfway mark.

Jim Palmer grabbed high scoring honors with 19 tallies, while Larry White was next with seven. Kandra and Henderson garnered three apiece for the Merrill hoopsters.

The final contest saw a Freshman-Sophomore outfit put the blocks to a Henley-Bonanza combine by the lopsided count of 33-8. The visiting firemen were never in the ball game at all and the K-men were able to score almost at will.

Bus Bussman led his teammates in the scoring department with a grand total of 17 points and Joe Zorosinski was next in line with eight markers. Brown picked up half of the total points tallied by the opposition with four counters. The hapless Henley-Bonanza aggregation racked up only two field goals in the entire game.

The Klamath boys looked a bit ragged Tuesday night and were having trouble with their lay-in shots. Coach Marble Cook is planning an intensive clinic Wednesday and will attempt to trim off some of the rough edges.

### New Eligibility Standard Talked

PASADENA, Calif., Nov. 29 (AP)—Establishment of a national eligibility standard for service men who return to college athletics after the war will be sought by the Pacific coast conference at the NCAA meetings in Columbus, Ohio, next January.

At the conference meeting yesterday, Prof. Hugh Willett of southern California, the conference's NCAA delegate, said: "I am going to the meeting for the primary purpose of bringing up for national discussion this vitally important topic." He added: "We believe that all conferences should adopt the same policies on the matter so that when the boys come home and wish to resume their football or other sports careers, they will find each school treating them with the same understanding."

The second day of the conference session saw the election of Jeff Cravath of Southern California as president of the coaches' association and Ralph (Pest) Welch of Washington, vice president.
