He saw action in the Tunisian and Sicilian campaigns and arrived in France shortly after D-Day. He holds the Purple Heart with an Oak Leaf cluster for wounds received in action.

Crown It With Cranberries!

THIS TIME of year, it seems to me there are few things so appetizing as cranberries. Just the thought of them makes me think of "good eating"—and they are so versatile! Here are a few ways to use them so that they will subtly put a crowning touch on any important dinner:

Cranberry-Orange Relish:

Ever popular to serve with chicken, turkey or meat. Make plenty and store in refrigerator. Coarsely grind 4 cups (1 lb.) cranberries and 2 large oranges. Add 2 cups sugar and let stand 3 to 4 hours. Makes about one quart.

Ten-minute Cranberry Sauce:

A fall and holiday must—luscious whole cranberries in their own rosy juice. Boil 2 cups water and 2 cups sugar together 5 minutes and add 4 cups (1 lb.) cranberries, cook slowly, without stirring, until skins pop (about 5 minutes). Skim and pour immediately into serving dish. Let stand undisturbed until cool. Makes 1 quart.

Lamb Chops with Cranberries:

Just before serving broiled or panfried lamb chops, top with Cranberry-Orange Relish or Cranberry Jelly.

Cranberries in Salad:

Jellied Relish Salad: Fold 1 cup Cranberry-Orange Relish and 1/2 cup sliced celery into 1 package dissolved lemon gelatin. Chill in individual or large mold until set. Unmold and serve with sweetened mayonnaise or salad dressing.

Cranberry Jelly-Chicken Salad:

A flavorful pair. Serve chicken salad with cubes of cranberry jelly lightly mixed in just before serving.

1 pkg. Jell-well Orange flavored gelatin
3/4 cup hot water
1/2 cup brown sugar, firmly packed

1 tsp. cinnamon
1/4 tsp. ginger
1/4 tsp. allspice
1/2 tsp. salt
1 1/2 cups cooked pumpkin

2 egg whites
3 tbsps. granulated sugar
9-inch baked pastry shell

Dissolve Jell-well in hot water; add brown sugar, spices and salt; mix well; add pumpkin. Cool until slightly set. Beat egg whites until foamy; add sugar gradually, and continue beating until stiff; fold into pumpkin mixture. Pour into pastry shell; chill until firm. Serves 6.
