INCOME TAX INFORMATION

This is to advise all my farm clients, and others who may wish my services, that the time for filing "farm income declarations" has been extended to "on or before Jan. 15, 1945," at which time you may file your regular complete return in lieu of said declaration if you so desire and pay the full tax thereon.

However, in order to give us time to make the complete and final return for you we should have your data in this office not later than December 15, so that it may be completed on time.

And to all others whose tax liability is not being withheld by employers, and who have not filed a declaration for this year or your 1944 income, that they should make their declaration on or before December 15, as this is the last chance. The new law, while simplified, does not excuse any of these from making such declaration and paying the approximate tax within the present year.
