### FILES SUIT

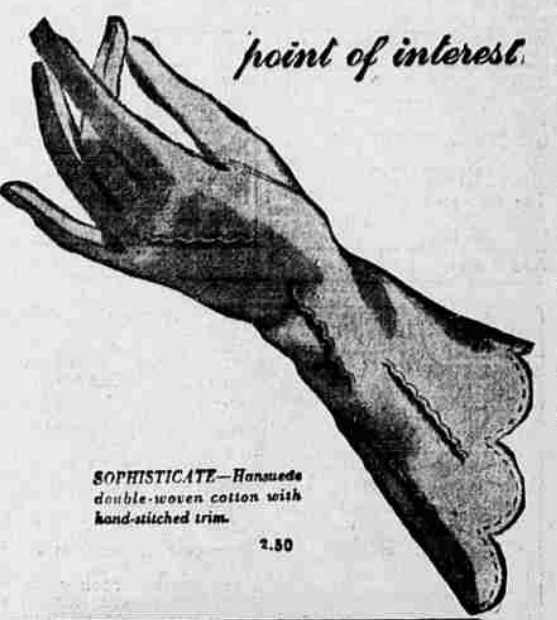
