

Reconversion Plans Shelved for Time Of Arms Shortage

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2 (AP)—Plans for reconversion to civilian production were shelved today because of the war effort might suffer.

The plan was conceived by Donald M. Nelson, then war production board chairman, and has been championed by his successor, J. A. Krug.

Recently, as serious shortages of some munitions developed, military officials demanded that the plan be killed, but Krug persuaded James F. Byrnes, war mobilization director, that this drastic step should not be taken.

Affected by the 90-day suspension order are all 68 group 1 areas of acute labor shortage, including such industrial centers as Detroit, Chicago, Cleveland, Newark, N. J., Salt Lake City, Los Angeles, San Francisco and Seattle.

The order also applies to 45 areas not in group 1 but recognized as regions where war production must be boosted.

Slapping a tight check-rein on reconversion for return to a peacetime economy, the government last night halted for 90 days any new authorization of consumer goods output in about 125 cities and their vicinities.

Besides eliminating addition "spot reconversion" temporarily in these areas, it ordered stringent restrictions on application of the civilian goods plan in all other regions.

The tightening up is not expected to result in cancellation of any consumer program already authorized, a WPB spokesman said.

The effect is much more literal interpretation of the original provisions of the spot authorization plan. These called for approval of civilian production only in localities where there were available manpower and facilities not required in the war effort.

POSTWAR LIFE FOR SHIPYARDS FORECAST

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 2 (AP)—The Portland area's war-born shipyards need not die with the advent of peace — according to predictions of the U. S. maritime commission's finance director.

R. E. Anderson told a press conference here that the U. S. merchant marine will need additional passenger ships and coastwise vessels after the war to fill needs of expanding foreign trade.

The Portland and Vancouver yards, which rank in the top lists of ship production, have a "good chance" to build these vessels, he said.

The nation will have a heavy surplus of victory and liberty freighters, Anderson said, some of which probably will be sold to foreign owners, and some tucked away in lay-up basins as "cheap insurance against war."

He said plans now being drafted would preserve some 1000 or 1500 liberty vessels at an annual upkeep of \$3000 per ship.

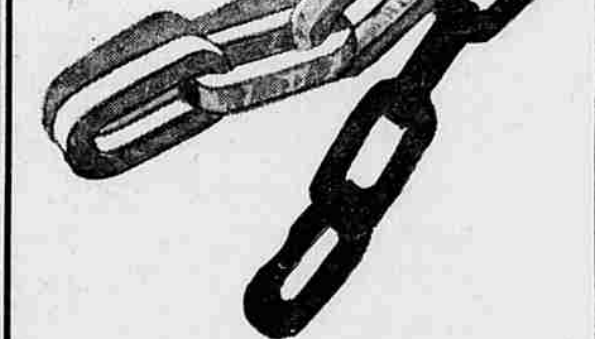
When the supreme commander stopped briefly at one point, a Nazi buzzbomb passed directly over the building he was visiting.

MARINES PLAN BOND TOUR FOR OREGON TOWNS

Winding up the 6th War Loan drive in eastern Oregon, a detachment of marines from the barracks will stage a seven-day entertainment tour and bond drive in six towns.

The 30-man marine troupe, including the post dance orchestra, will appear in Bend, Dec. 11; Burns, Dec. 12; Ontario, Dec. 13; La Grande, Dec. 14; Pendleton, Dec. 15, and The Dalles, Dec. 16.

Written and conducted by PFC Richard E. Nason, the show will feature two Pacific marines who have been decorated for bravery.

One, Sgt. Maier J. Rothschild, received the Navy Cross for holding off an overwhelming number of Japs all night on New Georgia. Ninety-six dead Nips were found around his machine gun position the next morning, and none broke through.

The other, Sgt. Tallbot Vogler, a member of the orchestra, received the Bronze Star for saving numerous lives on Bougainville while acting as a stretcher bearer in action.

Also included on the one-hour show are Sgt. James King, a concert pianist, PFC Carl Hagel, tenor, Cpl. Jack Mahoney, Irish tenor, and a comedy team, Sgt. Paul Smith and PFC Jack Janssen.

The only non-service feature of the program will be a Portland light opera singer, who will be accompanied by Sgt. King.

Two brand new songs will be played by the marine orchestra—the barracks theme song, "Klamath Blues," and "Indian Cream." Both were written by Sgt. Tony Linden, arranger for the orchestra.

Almost every member of the group has had professional entertainment experience, and have participated in shows at the base and in town.
