# CHARGES AGAINST DORSEY DISMISSED

By FRANK FRAWLEY LOS ANGELES, Dec. 7 (AP) Judge Arthur Crum today dismissed the assault charges against Tommy Dorsey, his wife, Pat Dane, and their neighbor, Allen Smiley, growing out of an attack on Jon Hall.

The court said it had been reluctant to take the case from the consideration of the jury but felt that under the state of the record it would be an abuse of its judicial discretion not to do so.

Judge Crum referred to one of the state's principal witnesses, Antonio Icaza, Panamanian actor, as a "fabulous, masterful fabricator of falsehoods, a perjurer pure and simple, demonstrated innumerable times out of his own mouth."

Icaza escaped last night from protective custody, the sheriff's office said, and committed to the county jail. He had been kept in custody in a hotel since his return from Panama.

"No court with any sense of justice," continued Judge Crum, "could permit such testimony as he gave, so thoroughly impeached as a matter of law, as it is, to go to the jury."

"To further protect this trial with its tremendous heavy expense to the taxpayers, would serve no useful purpose whatsoever."

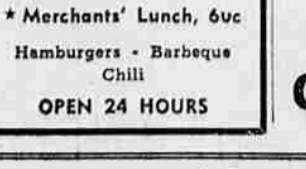

**Cookie and candy making**

TIME TO start thinking about those holiday "goodies"! And here are samples of how easy it is to turn those thoughts into delicious things-to-eat:

**GINGERBREAD MEN**

3 cups enriched flour	1/2 cup brown sugar
3 tps. baking powder	firmly packed
1/2 tsp. salt	2/3 cup dark molasses
1/2 tsp. ginger	1 egg
1/2 cup shortening	

Sift and measure flour; sift again with baking powder, salt, and ginger. Cream shortening and sugar until light and fluffy. Add molasses and unbleached egg; beat well. Add flour mixture gradually, mixing well after each addition. Roll on slightly floured board to 1/4-inch thickness. Cut with floured gingerbread-man cutter or cut a large square for the body, smaller circle for the head, and strips for the arms and legs. Place on lightly greased cookie or baking sheet. Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) until done, 10 to 12 minutes. Remove cookies immediately to rack; cool; store. Makes about 4 doz. 2-inch cookies or 6 large 10-inch gingerbread men.

**TURKISH DELIGHT**

3 tps. unflavored gelatin	2 tps. lemon juice
1/2 cup cold water	or lemon rind
2 cups sugar	8 drops yellow vegetable coloring
1/2 cup hot water	
2 tps. orange juice	

Soften gelatin in cold water. Combine sugar and hot water in saucepan and stir well until sugar is dissolved. Bring to boil; add softened gelatin and cook slowly for 20 minutes. Remove from heat and add orange and lemon juice, grated rind, and coloring. Pour to about 1-inch thickness into shallow pan (4 x 10) which has been rinsed with cold water. Let stand overnight; turn out on board lightly sprinkled with powdered sugar; cut in one-inch cubes and roll in powdered sugar. Makes about 40 cubes.
