KLAMATH SCHOOLS TOP LOAN QUOTAS

Three Klamath schools were proud to report that students and staff members had exceeded the quota set in the 8th War Loan, it was announced Friday.

Ereunt school children and employees, with a quota of \$1260 for students and \$1500 for teachers, total of \$2750, made cash purchases of \$3637.50.

At Altamont elementary the quota set was \$2437.50, and Thursday the purchases had totaled \$3668.75.
