often before. The tendency of censorship has been to PRELUDE UP the picture.)

WE learn today that the British have sent a fleet to the PACIFIC to operate under Nimitz command. It is said to be big enough to handle the WHOLE Jap fleet all by itself (if the Jap fleet could be caught all in one place.) This is in addition to the big fleet they're keeping in the Indian ocean.

THE Japs announce the death of another admiral—bringing the total of killed admirals announced by them since May 7 to 73. Since May 23, they've announced the death of 18 generals.

It sounds a little screwy. Maybe there has been a lot of harakiri. Maybe their new admirals and generals are better than the dead ones.

SIDEGLIGHTS from Europe: The French and Russians (De Gaulle and Stalin) have signed a 20-year alliance treaty, similar to that signed by Britain and Russia.

Count Sforza (stormy petrel of present Italy) says the reason the British don't like him is that they brought heavy pressure on him to accept Victor Emanuel as KING, but he refused.

DE GAULLE, praising his accomplishments in Moscow, concludes with: "Long live SOVIET Russia." Whatever he means, getting France back into the European picture will be helpful. The French PEOPLE, whose leadership has often been BAD, are a good influence.

NEEDING more guns, more shells, more fighting equipment of all kinds, we're tightening up on draft regulations, the purpose being to force more effort into war work.

The simple, UNPALATABLE truth is that here on the home front we've been HAVING TOO MUCH. Modern war NEEDS a nation's TOTAL production—but, of course, the civilians have to live, so SOME production has to be diverted to the needs of the home front.

The point is that if the civilians have too much the fighting forces will have too little.

TO cite just one or two instances, RACE TRACKS, NIGHT CLUBS, etc. here on the home front, especially in the big cities, have been breaking all records.

The energy thus expended, which is wasted so far as helping to lick the Japs and the Germans is concerned, would IN ITSELF have made a lot of the shells we now need so acutely on the western front.

WE wonder quite a little how the Germans manage to KEEP UP their war production in view of the fact that their potential productive resources are so much smaller than ours.

The brutal truth is that they are putting MUCH MORE of their TOTAL EFFORT into war production.

Foresters, requesting that individual or group interests be kept to a minimum, pledged their support of the new federal cooperative sustained yield program.

The conference decided to ask the federal communications commission to authorize a frequency band for fire crews, as radio plays a vital role in the work of forest fire fighters, parachutists and emergency work crews.
