

# SEWER SYSTEM PLAN AGREED ON BY CITY

A temporary agreement between the city and the federal housing authority was approved by the city council Monday night when G. R. West, utility engineer for FPHA, asked for permission to go ahead and construct the new sewer project with city facilities.

The council, eager to assist the project, asked for a temporary agreement for the files and official agreement should be forthcoming from Seattle within a matter of days. In the meantime, the work will go ahead as scheduled.

Councilman Walter Wiesinger asked what fire protection the FPHA expected from the city and Fire Chief Keith K. West advised that he had issued such protection. West said that a six-inch line from the main on Washburn way, being installed all around the project and that two hydrants were included in plans. There are also hydrants across Washburn way and within the limits.

Mayor John Houston suggested that the ordinance providing for the project be reviewed by Councilman Rollin Campbell had observed that an ordinance prohibits calls outside the limits with the exception of special cases.

Wiesinger advised the council that the November bill for the Klamath Heating plant charged the city with \$34,000 and the fire station with \$21,000 for service rendered, was approved by the finance committee on the grounds that it was "out of line with previous practice."

This councilman also recommended that when rock from the quarry is available that it be used to fill a hole at Martin and Main. This was approved.
