

WAGE, LABOR PROBLEM TALK SET FOR MEET

Dean Robert C. Line, wage stabilization director of the 12th regional labor board and William A. Babcock, regional attorney, will conduct informal round-table discussions on local wage and labor problems with employer and union groups at special meetings in Klamath Falls, Thursday, December 14.

Line, who will be the featured speaker at a noon luncheon meeting sponsored by the chamber of commerce, Willard hotel, is on leave of absence as dean of the school of business from the University of Montana. Formerly owner of general stores in the state of Montana and at present owner of a several thousand acre cattle ranch in his home state, Line has long been familiar with payroll problems of employers. He is said to be equally familiar with the problems of labor, having worked as a ranch hand and in other employ capacities frequently during his life.

Charles Stark, chamber of commerce secretary, said that reservations for the Thursday noon forum luncheon at the Willard must be made at the chamber by noon, Wednesday. A telephone call to the chamber, 5193, will handle the reservation, he said.

As wage stabilization director of the 12th regional labor board for the past year, he has been brought in close contact with wage and labor problems in Washington and Oregon. "Stabilization and Inflation" will be the subject of Line's luncheon speech, after which the meeting will be opened for an informal question and answer session. The chamber of commerce has invited a large group of employers to attend the luncheon and all who have specific problems are urged to stay for the discussion afterwards.

Babcock will be the featured speaker at similar meetings to be held in Medford, Wednesday of this week. As regional attorney, charged with the responsibility of the enforcing of the wage stabilization act in the 12th region, he will supplement Line's speech in Klamath Falls, explaining the duties of the enforcement division and telling of penalties which can be imposed upon employers found in violation.

Babcock, who was attorney for the national war labor relations board before joining the regional war labor board several months ago, is well grounded in labor relations as they are concerned with government regulations. Both men will meet with union representatives in the evening at 7:30 o'clock in the Willard hotel. Short speeches will be followed by round-table discussion of the local wage problems which concern the unions particularly.

Detailed information on general orders and wage stabilization regulations will be available at both meetings for those who are interested.

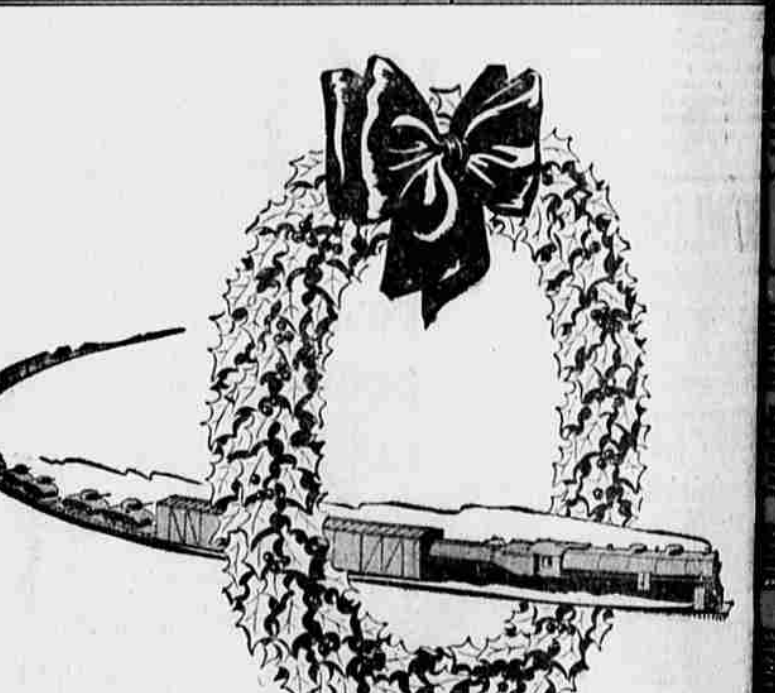
