H. A. TALBOT DIES IN HOSPITAL HERE

H. A. Talbot, 70, for the past 36 years a resident of Klamath county, died at 6:45 p. m. Tuesday at Klamath Valley hospital. Mr. Talbot had suffered a heart attack a short time before his passing.

Mr. Talbot was born in Kimball, Minn., July 7, 1874. In 1898 he was married to Aicie May Kennedy and four children were born of this union. Mrs. Talbot died in Klamath Falls in 1919. After teaching school for several years, Mr. Talbot decided to move west and came here in 1908 with his family. For several years he was engaged in the carpentry and contracting business. In 1911, he purchased a ranch on the Ashland highway. He sold this place about five years ago and at the time of his death was residing on a small acreage near here.

On October 11, 1912, Mr. Talbot was married to Fannie Gordon, a life-long resident of this city. Four children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Talbot. In his younger years, Mr. Talbot was an active member of the Methodist church and WCTU.

He is survived by his wife, Fannie, and five children, Blanche Moteschenbacher, Mildred Sweeney and Nellie Luttrell, all of this city, Marie Harlan of Lakeview and S/Sgt. Reuben Talbot, now serving in Italy. One sister, Mildred Solle, lives in Minneapolis.

Final rites will be conducted from Whitlock's at 1:30 p. m. Friday.

BOARD LOOKS INTO CASE OF KARL BOLD

A board of investigation at the Marine Barracks continued to go into the facts of the case concerning the death of Karl Bold, 41-year-old Henley farmer, for which PFC Herbert Daniel Stevens, 21, USMC, is being held in the barracks' brig at the present time. Also investigating is the district attorney's office.

Dr. George H. Adler, county coroner, who performed an autopsy on the body of Bold late Monday, said that no report would be made until the findings of Dr. Joseph Beeman, University of Oregon school of medicine, were returned here. Until Dr. Beeman's report on microscopic study of tissue sent from Bold's brain, is received, the autopsy will not be complete, Dr. Adler stated Wednesday.

Bold was found the morning of December 6, in the rear of Kerns Implement on S. 6th. He died Sunday without regaining consciousness.
