

# OPA INCREASE ON CEILINGS FOR HOGS SET

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13 (AP)—The OPA Tuesday announced an increase of 75 cents a hundredweight in the ceiling price on barrow and gilt hogs weighing more than 270 pounds.

Effective today, the new price will be \$14.75 a hundred for these heavier types. The change will not apply to sows, stags and boars, which will continue to have a ceiling of \$14.

All hogs weighing less than 270 pounds already have a maximum price of \$14.75.

Extension of the higher ceiling to heavier gilts and barrows was recommended by the war food administration and approved by Stabilization Director Fred M. Vinson.

Explaining the adjustment, OPA said that harvesting of a record crop of corn this year and a "satisfactory improvement" in the supply of other types of feed prompted the change.

It added that farmers now may feed hogs to heavier weights "without the fear of a discount." This should result, the agency said, in a greater volume of pork and lard from hogs now on hand.

"At present, the demands for pork products and lard by government procurement agencies are extremely high, and the shortage of this class of production for civilians is being felt nationally," OPA said.

It was stated that without weight limitations and with adequate feed supplies, "a farmer can hold his hogs for a limited time when and if market glut develops."

# Harvey to Introduce Bill Prohibiting Wrapping Liquor

PORTLAND, Dec. 13 (AP)—Multnomah County Representative Joseph E. Harvey plans to introduce in the state legislature a bill which would prohibit state liquor stores from using paper to wrap up bottles for customers.

"There seems to be a conspiracy of silence regarding this wanton waste of tons of paper for wrapping whiskey purchases, while we must carry groceries home unwrapped," Harvey declared in a letter to the Oregon liquor control commission.

# Stricter Treatment Eyed For Juveniles

PORTLAND, Dec. 13 (AP)—Juveniles who shoplift for a thrill have forced Portland merchants to adopt a sterner policy when they catch one in the act.

The problem has become too serious to continue letting the youngsters off with a warning, the retail trade bureau has decided. "We have been too soft-hearted in the past," said the bureau president. "Future offenders will be turned over to the police."

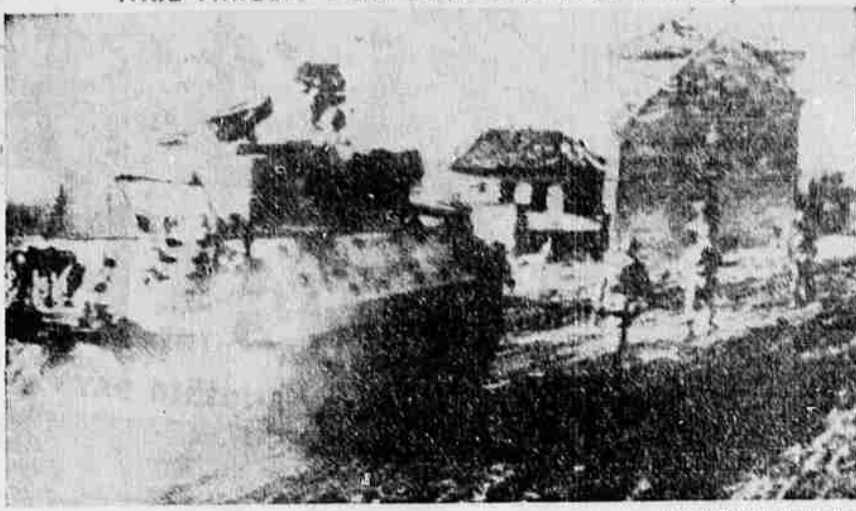

# 1943 PROPERTY LAW VALID IN OREGON

SALEM, Dec. 13 (AP)—The 1251 married couples who took advantage of the 1943 Oregon community property law could be permitted by legislative act, to elect to go back to the old system. Attorney General George Neuner ruled today for Governor Earl Snel.

Neuner said that the Oregon act is still valid, although the United States supreme court decided that the Oklahoma community property law could not be used to split incomes of husbands and wives in order to come under lower federal income tax brackets.

The Oregon law, providing that persons may elect to come under community property, was copied from the Oklahoma law. While the Oregon law still is valid, Neuner said that its single purpose—to reduce federal income taxes for more wealthy couples—has been defeated by the United States supreme court.

# CANBY VOTES FOR NEW SCHOOL PLANT

CANBY, Calif.—Canby is to have a new grade school building. This was decided on Tuesday, December 5, when a \$20,000 bond issue was presented to the community at a special election for their approval. A vote of 75 to 25 decided in favor of the construction of the new building.

Success of the issue was attributed to two factors—it was almost impossible to wade through the water in the present school yard, and the condition of the building itself is not favorable.

# CANUCKS SPAN LAMONE; WIN BRIDGEHEADS

ROME, Dec. 13 (AP)—Canadian troops have spanned the Lamone river and established two bridgeheads, northwest of the highway town of Faenza, shoving the Germans back two miles in the direction of Lugo, allied headquarters announced today.

The bridgeheads, thrust across the stream some nine miles from Faenza, were joined in a continuous front of 6000 yards after 24 hours of stiff fighting. The northern flank of the attack pushed along the Ravenna-Bologna railway northwest of Russi and the allied troops were reported astride this route for some distance. This railway first was cut northeast of Russi several days ago.

The Germans were thrown back beyond the Fosso Vecchio O Cantrigo, a small stream paralleling the Lamone. More than 300 prisoners were taken and a number of armored vehicles were knocked out.

Below the new bridgehead line to Faenza the allied positions were unchanged as the flooded Lamone provided an effective barrier.

The success constituted a grave threat to German troops battling to hold Faenza, for eighth army forces previously had succeeded in winning a bridgehead across the Lamone below the city and have been holding it against repeated enemy counterattacks.

The Canadians launched their

assault after being held for a week on east bank of the rain-swollen stream. Despite violent opposition they battled their way across the stream in 24 hours of bitter fighting.

On the fifth army front the enemy made several attacks south of Bologna but all were declared turned back. In one of these assaults, the Germans gained temporary possession of Castel Nuova on the right flank of the fifth army area.

Italian-based heavy bombers attacked targets in Germany yesterday and Balkan air force units bombed and strafed vehicles in Yugoslavia.
