An appreciative audience heard the Klamath Union high school music department present a program of sacred music in the auditorium Tuesday night and were high in praise of the excellent performance of the orchestra, girls' glee club and a cappella choir. The program was the annual Christmas gift to the public.

The orchestra opened with a group of three numbers with Mozart's "Eine Kleine Nachtmusik" especially well received. Those in the audience who have watched the progress of the orchestra noticed a decided improvement in technique, the result of many years of planning and continuous study.

Second group of numbers was presented by the girls' glee club with the singing of "Jingle Bells" in the modern manner having a strong appeal for the audience. This number was arranged by Joseph Brye.

"A Christmas Chorale," with music by W. B. Olds, was heard for the first time in Klamath Falls and was chosen as the Christmas cantata for the voices of the a cappella choir. Narrator was Wendell B. Smith of the high school staff, and at least one-fourth of the cantata was carried by Dorothy Howry, vocalist, who contributed much to the success of the evening with her clear, young voice. As in the past, the choir received rapt attention.

Portlanders Show Most Race Prejudice, Reports Johnson

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 14 (AP)—This metropolitan area, the negro population of which has increased from 2100 to 20,000 since the war, shows more racial prejudice than any other coastal metropolis, a New York worker said today.

Reginald A. Johnson, field secretary of the national urban league which is working for improvement of negro living conditions, reported an unusual proportion of "white only" restaurants here and other signs of discrimination. The situation will present unpleasant possibilities when negro residents, most of them shipyard workers, are thrown into the job-seeking pool after the war, Johnson said. His proposals: housing built on economic, not racial, groups; fair system of lay-offs in war industries; and development of new peacetime industry.

Voting Strength In House Divided Between GOP, Demos

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—The resignation of Rep. Magnuson (D-Wash.), left the democratic and republican voting strength in the house at a stand-off today with 212 seats for each party.

Magnuson resigned yesterday to accept immediate appointment to the senate, to which he was elected in last month's election. There are six house vacancies on the democratic side. The equal division between the two major parties marks the first congress since 1939 in which the republicans have had as many votes as the democrats. There are four minor party members. The senate lineup remains: democrats, 57; republicans, 38; progressive, 1.
