# ROBERT LINE WARNS AGAINS<sup>-</sup>

Inflation leads to political revolution, and political revolution means disastrous repudiation of government debt, Dr. Robert C. Line, wage stabilization director of the northwest regional war labor board, told a chamber of commerce forum

a chamber of commerce forum luncheon Wednesday.

Dr. Line outlined what he de-scribed the sound basis for wage and living cost stabilization during the war period, and expressed the hope that the movement to amend the "little steel formula" will not go so far as to promote serious inflationary spirals.

Changing little steel, if a contribution to inflation, would be unsound even though just from the wage-earners' standpoint, Dr. Line indicated.
