of the senate foreign relations committee here in Washington. Where the meeting might take place remained a subject of speculation. It necessarily must remain secret for security reasons. But probably it will de-

pend on how far Marshall Stalin might be willing to travel and whether, by the time of the conference, he has launched another winter offensive of the red armies.  
**Not Before Inauguration**  
Pressing problems of war and peace dictated another get-together. But plans of the president argued against a meeting before his inauguration.  
Senator Connally, in urging an early meeting of the three leaders, declared the United States "must be consulted" in the matter of European boundaries.  
"Matters of high import affecting the peace treaty must not be determined without consultation with the United States," he told a reporter. "We are spending lavishly of our blood and treasure in the war and we have a right to a voice in the peace terms which follow. That right must not be denied."

## ROBERT LINE WARNS AGAINST INFLATION HERE

Inflation leads to political revolution, and political revolution means disastrous repudiation of government debt, Dr. Robert C. Line, wage stabilization director of the northwest regional war labor board, told a chamber of commerce forum luncheon Wednesday.  
Dr. Line outlined what he described the sound basis for wage and living cost stabilization during the war period, and expressed the hope that the movement to amend the "little steel formula" will not go so far as to promote serious inflationary spirals.  
Changing little steel, if a contribution to inflation, would be unsound even though just from the wage-earners' standpoint, Dr. Line indicated.

Without price control through OPA and wage control through the war labor board, the cost of living in this war period would have gone far over the levels of World War I, Dr. Line said. He presented a graph to show how controls had leveled off the rise of the cost of living after the entry of the United States into the present war.

Dr. Line was accompanied by William Babcock, regional attorney for the war labor board. They held meetings with local labor leaders in the afternoon and evening Thursday.  
Lt. Elton Jones, labor relations officer of the 13th naval district, and Roy Smith, senior inspector, wage and hours division, were introduced at the chamber of commerce forum.

tween 3:30 and 6 a. m. today (Japanese time) and dropped incendiary bombs. It may be the prelude to another heavy American raid equalling the smash at inflammable Nagoya two days ago.

**8-1 Ratio**  
Gen. Douglas MacArthur estimates the first 3 days of the Philippines invasion has cost the defending Japanese 82,554 casualties and the Americans 10,409 killed, wounded and missing.

Fighting has ranged so far from Pearl Harbor that Adm. Chester W. Nimitz, Pacific fleet commander, announced he will establish advanced headquarters in a forward area. A few days ago the Australian radio said Nimitz was moving his headquarters to Guam.

There has been no further word from Washington on the Superfortress raid against military targets in Burma and Thailand, other than that the size of the force involved was "substantial."

**Startling Maneuver**  
Rembert James, Associated Press war correspondent aboard a flagship of a fast carrier force off the Philippines, said the new American tactics involved sending air patrols day and night over every one of the almost 100 Japanese air fields on Luzon island. He described the maneuver as "startling."

Fighting on Leyte continued vicious as ever with the Americans registering small but consistent gains.

Three columns of Chinese troops, now 40 miles within Kwangsi province in pursuit of retreating Japanese, are converging on the Japanese-held town of Hochih, important railroad center linking Kweichow and Kwangsi provinces, the Chung King radio reported.

Duren and that bastion was shelled heavily.  
The third army penetrated Germany again six miles east of Sarreguimines, capturing heavily fortified Habkirchen and pushing a mile beyond, while to the north heavy fighting continued in the area near Saarlautern.

**Reds Engage Nazis**  
Russian tanks and motorized infantry engaged Nazi elite forces in a savage battle along the Ipoly river north of the Danube bend, a little more than 85 miles east of Bratislava, Slovakian capital. Berlin said the Russians attempted to storm Ipolyzag, a half-mile north of the border.

The strong thrust was coordinated closely with red army operations seeking to cut off the Germans in eastern Slovakia, and the Germans were said to be rushing reserves to meet the threat to natural defenses guarding the shortest invasion route to Vienna, 115 miles to the west.

## Marine Held On AWOL Charge

Ruth Evelyn Miller, 21, of Hayward, Calif., was convicted in San Francisco this week of a charge of "harboring a fugitive from the marine corps" in connection with the case of PFC Walter E. Burovski of the Klamath Marine Barracks.  
Burovski is held at the Barracks brig, after being allegedly away without leave. He was arrested after leaving here and going to Hayward, where he was taken into the home of Mrs. Miller. Authorities who found Burovski said they located him under a bed.

a failure on the part of the three great powers to work together would damage all our hopes for the future structure of world government." A quarrel among these powers, he declared, would fatally rupture this world organization.

**Entitled to Territory**  
He said Russia was entitled to certain territory in the east of old Poland as a matter of re-assurance about her western frontiers.

Poland, Churchill said, would be compensated for its sacrifice of Lwow and territory near the Ukraine by tracts of East Prussia and Danzig, to be wrested from Germany.

**Asks Meeting**  
In one of the most significant common addresses of the war, a speech which drew from one member the comment that the Atlantic charter has become a ghost—the prime minister also appealed to President Roosevelt and Marshal Stalin to meet with him "at the earliest possible moment."

Apparently distraught over diplomatic developments which have raised differences among the United Nations, the prime minister confessed disappointment that it had "been found impossible to arrange any meeting of the three great powers."

The cleric was believed ready to attempt formation of a government acceptable to all parties, pending a plebiscite to decide whether the country is to remain a monarchy or become a republic. However, in Athens there was no indication that King George would agree to the plan. The king is in London.  
Infiltrating Elms entered Omnia square during the night, laid Teller mines and engaged in a brief skirmish with British parachute troops before withdrawing. British headquarters said they retired before the mines were properly laid, and the explosives were later cleared.

Hills police. We believe that these witnesses should be subjected to further questioning by the district attorney's investigators.

District Attorney Fred Howser said he couldn't agree with the coroner's demand, and added:
