

HEALTH GROUP HERE EMPLOYS NEW SECRETARY

To meet the increased interest in the Klamath county health program, the County Health association, with the recommendation of the state health office at Portland, employed a part-time executive secretary in Klamath Falls.

Mrs. Izola J. Parker has accepted the position here and at present suitable office space is being sought. It is hoped that accommodations can be secured by January 1.

At the present time, the Klamath County Health association is in the midst of its drive for the sale of tuberculosis Christmas seals. A seal sales committee has been appointed and is now very active in trying to supply interested persons with the number of Christmas seals they desire.

The seal committee is composed of Mrs. E. R. Ellingson of Klamath Falls, president; Mrs. John McFee of Klamath Falls, first vice president; Mrs. J. Perry Haley of Malin, second vice president; Mrs. A. F. Blocklinger of Chiloquin, third vice president; Mrs. Gilbert Fleet of Klamath Falls, secretary; and Geoffrey C. Blohm of Klamath Falls, treasurer.

The association has active committees in Malin, Merrill, Chiloquin and Gilechrist and is planning to expand still further during the coming year.

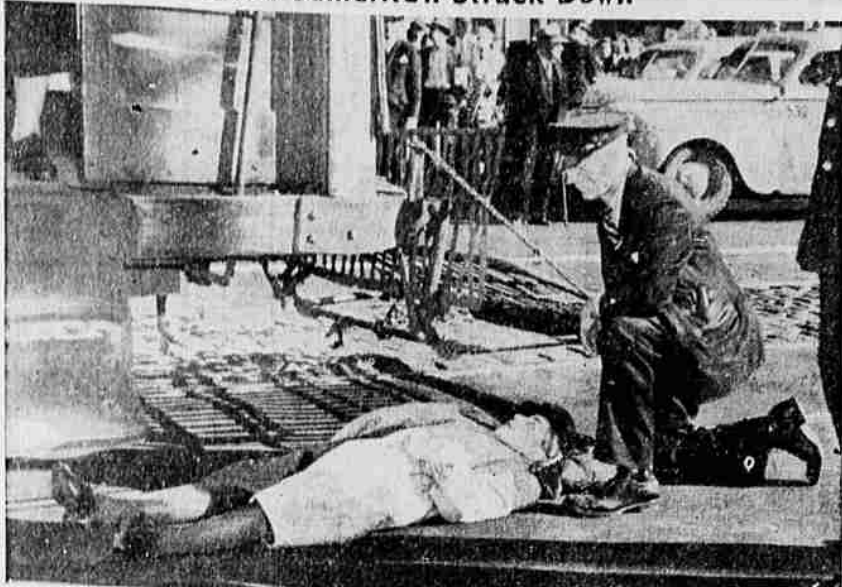
The county committees are organized to promote health education, membership, public health activities, finance and the Christmas seal sale.

Tuberculosis Deaths In First Part of 1944 Near 1943 Total

PORTLAND, Dec. 18 (AP)—Oregon's tuberculosis deaths for the first six months of 1944 totaled 156 compared with 201 for all of last year, Saldie Orr Dunbar, executive secretary of the Oregon Tuberculosis association, announced.

Mrs. Dunbar said that the state's Christmas seal sale for the first 13 days of the drive totaled \$40,000, approximately \$7000 ahead of the same period last year.

Desk Man Aids Cargo Pilot In Bombing Japs in Burma

BHAMO, Burma, Dec. 15 (Delayed) (AP)—Burma cargo and transport plane pilots and administrative officers seldom get a chance to fight a shooting war, but here in north Burma they organized a bombing mission on their own.

Combat Cargo Pilot Lt. Robert S. Fisher, East Orange, N. J., and Capt. John Davis of Philadelphia, a headquarters staff man, found a dud bomb in a village near the front.

They fastened home-made fuses on both ends of the bomb, put it in Fisher's empty transport, rounded up a makeshift crew and took off.

Over Bhamo, a few miles from the airstrip, Sgt. Robert Zook, Phoenix, Ariz., an engineer, pulled the end fuse pin. Lt. H. C. Missimer, Audubon, N. J., an engineer, pulled the nose fuse pin.

When Davis, acting as copilot and bombardier, rang the plane's bell, Cpl. Laurence Johnson, Yakima, Wash., another engineer, kicked the

bomb out of the plane's open door and down toward a Japanese position.

Two hours later the three engineers were back working on a road, the pilot went back to flying cargo and the administrative officer went back to his desk.

Linfield Fire Loss Set at \$25,000

McMINNVILLE, Dec. 18 (AP)—President Harry L. Dillin of Linfield college estimated at \$25,000 the damage incurred when the school's heating plant building was destroyed by fire Saturday.

A truck and two power lawn mowers were destroyed, but boilers and equipment are expected to be repaired before classes resume after the Christmas holiday.

CARE TO AVOID MISHAPS OVER HOLIDAY URGED

Since Klamath has been fortunate in avoiding accidents in the previous holiday seasons, Keith Ambrose, fire chief, today asked the people of the city to continue their efforts to prevent any accidents during the coming Christmas holidays.

Ambrose also warned against hazards that might arise this year, such as substituting candles for the usual electric lights that decorate Christmas trees. If lights cannot be obtained, he said, do not use candles or other such dangerous lighting devices.

At Christmas parties, flimsy dresses and paper caps around the fireplace filled with Christmas paper and wrappings should be avoided. To further prevent possible casualties, he advises that Christmas trees be removed and destroyed immediately after Christmas Day.

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Portland Man Dies After Being Struck By Two Automobiles

PORTLAND, Dec. 18 (AP)—Struck by two automobiles, J. Walter Robertson, 57, Portland died in a hospital here yesterday morning to raise the city's 1944 traffic-death toll to 39.

Robertson, according to Capt. J. W. Purcell of the traffic bureau, was struck first by a car operated by Byron W. Wolverton, Portland.

While he still lay in the street a machine driven by J. D. Dillard, Gresham, ran over his legs after striking Purcell's parked car, the latter said.

Dillard was charged with drunken driving, disorderly conduct, having no operator's license and driving a car with defective brakes.

PROGRAM OUTLINED TO COMBAT FEVER

PORTLAND, Dec. 18 (AP)—Dr. Thomas L. Meador, city health officer, today recommended a seven-point program to combat undulant fever in Portland.

Included in the program are a code governing the manufacture of ice cream and other frozen desserts, proper pasteurization or aging of cheese and 100 per cent pasteurization of milk and butter.

His recommendations came after a survey of 90 ice cream fountains disclosed high bacteria count in samples of some and in a number of containers used to wash ice cream dippers.

Dr. Meador said the survey showed that milk products, other than in bottles and cans, were not properly controlled.

Portland has had more than 200 cases of undulant fever this year.
