

# RETURNS FROM WARM SPRINGS TRIP

D. HAROLD OLIVER, SHINGTON, Dec. 19 (AP)—President Roosevelt returned from a three weeks' vacation in Warm Springs, Ga., after a momentous month in the midst of war and allied strategy—plus the beginning of a new congress—the chief came back to the White House with a few pounds gained and a few pounds lost. He arrived by special train and went immediately to the White House to start a routine day.

Returned from Georgia via Lejeune, on New river at Greenville, S. C., where yesterday afternoon he made a two-day inspection tour of the vast combat reservation. This was his only side trip outside of the White House during his absence from Washington.

On the drive through the mountains with its commandant, Gen. John Marston, he saw other things a group of war dogs parade with their trainers while TNT blasts off in simulation of combat.

Roosevelt planned to hold a major news conference late in the day.

It will be the first since the day he left for Warm Springs at which he announced the resignation of Cordell Hull as secretary of state. 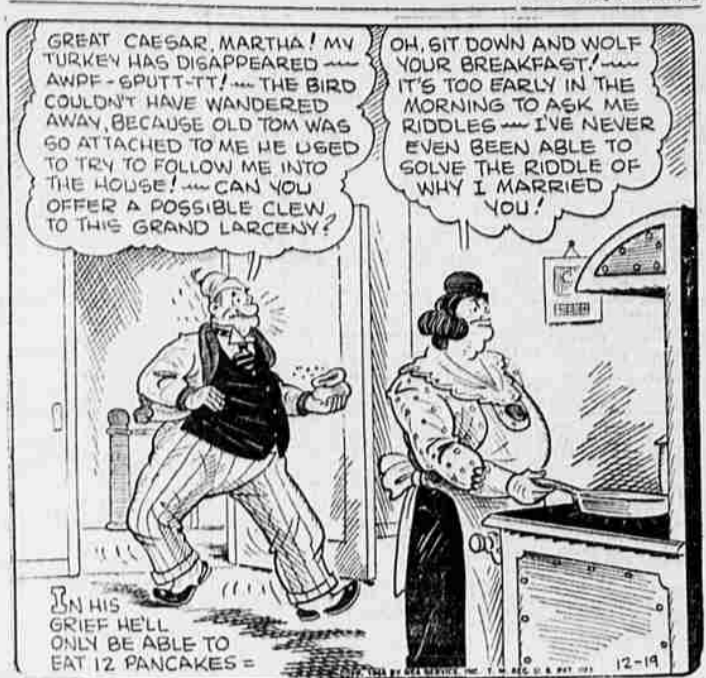

## VET CHARGED WITH ROBBERY OF BANK

SEATTLE, Dec. 19 (AP)—For several minutes one quart of water was worth \$4000 yesterday but today police held an ex-soldier and former shipyard worker in connection with the holdup of the Seaboard branch of the Seattle First National bank.

The man was identified by Det. Capt. Marshall Seraford as Robert E. Afrig.

He was captured in the alley outside the bank by H. G. Peterson, bank guard; Vice President Allen B. Morgan and Personnel Manager G. B. Tully after having confronted Teller Carl Kernerud with a note reading: "I have one quart of nitroglycerine. I demand \$4000. If you refuse to give, I will drop it. If you sound the alarm or follow me, I will drop it." Kernerud complied with the demand but stepped on the alarm at the same time, notifying bank guards and officials he was in trouble. The battle, taken by Peterson, later was found to contain only water.

## Commission Opens Bids On Projects

PORTLAND, Dec. 19 (AP)—The state highway commission opened bids on highway projects today after approving a 1945 budget calling for \$16,292,000 expenditures. The budget would spend \$5,740,000 on federal cooperative projects and \$5,320,000 for highway maintenance. Commissioners estimated a revenue of \$24,294,000, including \$3,300,000 from licenses and \$9,600,000 from gasoline taxes. Lease of Pilot Butte state park at Bend to the federal government was approved.

## HARPER MAY LOSE ALL BEER TAVERNS

PORTLAND, Dec. 19 (AP)—The state liquor control commission pondered today whether Harper, Ore., should have any more beer taverns.

The Malheur county court, upon petition by residents aroused by the fatal injury of a farmer in a tavern, recommended that none of Harper's three taverns be given license renewals.

Robert E. Lees, attorney for the taverns, presented another petition asking that beer sales be continued, and accused the county court of trying to thrust local option upon Harper. Voting by local option is impossible in Harper, since it is unincorporated.

The commission reduced a suspension of Mecca Billiards, Klamath Falls, from 45 to 15 days. License of John Matatchi, the Tavern, Klamath Falls, was revoked on three charges—selling wine out of hours, allowing minors on the premises, and conviction of an employe of a misdemeanor committed on the premises.

## Some Superintendents May Object to Raise

PORTLAND, Dec. 19 (AP)—Some Oregon county school superintendents won't like having their salaries raised, claims Roy Cannon, superintendent of Multnomah county schools.

He told a group of state teachers' officials and legislators, meeting here to discuss proposed legislation, that some superintendents fear replacement by other educators, attracted by higher salaries.

The teachers' organizations, in addition to superintendents' increases, proposed higher wages and a state pension plan for teachers, and a law requiring all children under 16 to remain in school.

## POLICE ASSURE JAPS PROTECTION

SALEM, Dec. 19 (AP)—Japanese-Americans who will return to Oregon were assured of protection today by State Police Supt. Charles P. Pray, while U. S. Rep. James W. Mott said "it is a great mistake" to let them come back home.

Pray said: "I consider it my duty to give protection to all citizens and Japanese-Americans are just as much citizens as anyone else. They have the same constitutional rights, and they should not be discriminated against."

Pray said, however, he would be handicapped in dealing with any violence that might occur, "because the army has been taking so many of my men."

Mott's statement said: "It is a great mistake on the part of the war relocation authority to permit Japanese and particularly Japanese alien enemies to return to the Pacific coast. There is no necessity for this action either from an economic or international political angle."

Mott, who arrived here yesterday by navy plane to inspect naval installations and to spend the Christmas holidays at his home here, has a bill in congress to deport Japanese aliens after the war.

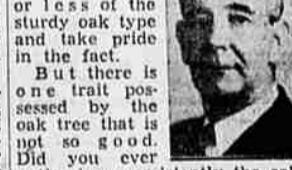
