HEUVEL CASE WITNESS BACK IN CUSTODY

to the bizarre case in connection with the circumstances of Miss Collins' reported escape last Sunday. Chief Heuvel told the press Monday that she got away from him and another officer when they took her to the Pete Savoy place on Broad street to get clothing she had left there.

Different Version

Deputy District Attorney Humble said that the girl had given another version of the reported escape. He declined to disclose details of her statement, but stated her version did not tally with that reported in the press as coming from Heuvel.

Miss Collins was held last week in the city jail to serve out a vagrancy sentence. On Friday, she was taken to the district attorney's office to give a statement in the investigation of the Heuvel case, according to the district attorney's office. The statement was to be transcribed and typed before her signature.

On Sunday, the alleged escape occurred.

Signs Statement

Today, Humble reported, the girl had signed the statement and given an additional statement to the district attorney's office.

This was the major development today in the Heuvel case. Heuvel has branded as false the charge of the younger girl that he committed an act in October which the state alleges contributed to the delinquency of the girl, who was then 15 years of age.

Mayor John H. Houston said Wednesday that Chief of Police Heuvel had advised him that he, Heuvel, would be glad to withdraw or accept a suspension for the good of the department until the matter was settled.

Houston advised the press that in all fairness to those involved that he was studying the matter and would make a statement Thursday.

Fathers Protest Police Action To Vandenberg

The four fathers who appeared before the city council Monday night to protest action of the city police whom they charged with loading a group of high school students into the paddy wagon the night of December 8, waited upon Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg Tuesday to discuss the matter with him.

The parents were advised to go to the judge by the city council on report of Chief Earl Heuvel that his men were acting under orders of the county juvenile authorities.

Judge Vandenberg said he discussed the matter at length and told the group he hoped, after January 1, to put in force a regulation whereby such matters as the December 8 incident would be handled in a different manner. Judge Vandenberg told the fathers that they would enjoy cooperation between his office and their children at all times and that he sincerely hoped there would not be a recurrence of the incident.

Slow Gains Made On Italian Front

ROME, Dec. 20 (AP)— Polish and Indian troops of the eighth army have virtually cleared all enemy forces from the area south of the Senio river and west of the main Bologna-Rimini highway, where the nazis have been putting up a stubborn fight for two weeks, allied headquarters announced today.

Strong German resistance held the eighth army units to limited gains north and northeast of Faenza. Headquarters disclosed last night that a savage enemy counterattack in that area had forced allied troops to fall back to the northern edge of the highway city.

Vinson Studies Ward, WLB Clash

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20 (AP)— The Montgomery Ward-war labor board clash apparently is resting at the White House today for a decision.

Economic Stabilizer Vinson, it is understood, is studying the big chain's refusal to comply with orders directing minimum wages and union security in four Detroit stores strike-bound for 12 days.

Vinson can invoke economic restrictions against Ward or recommend to President Roosevelt seizure of some or all of the stores in Detroit and six other cities where Ward units are involved in pending cases.

car by the side of the road and she turned around to investigate when her suspicions were aroused. The car was gone, but she found Evans covered with blood at the side of the road.

Brought to Town

Mrs. Fidler took Evans into Klamath Falls, turned him over to city police and officers called the Marine Barracks. He was moved to the Barracks by ambulance. Evans is suffering from a skull fracture and multiple abrasions and late Wednesday his condition remained critical but slightly improved. He was unconscious at a late hour Wednesday morning.

No charge had been filed against Summerville late today but the Barracks' provost marshal was preparing a charge, it is understood. Summerville was arrested at Lombard Motor company where he is employed as a mechanic. He is a discharged army man, veteran of the South Pacific.

Mrs. Fermon Evans lives at the Arcade hotel. Name of the second marine was not learned and it is understood that he is not involved. Summerville told Sheriff Low that he did not "remember" the incident.

Change in Spud Shipping Made

An interstate commerce commission order permitting release of railroad cars to western potato growers but prohibiting their movement until a war food administration permit is obtained, was announced this week in an effort to break the impasse which has halted shipment of potatoes to meet military need.

Previously growers in designated sections of Oregon, Idaho and California were unable to obtain cars because an ICC regulation required the railroads to conserve cars until shippers showed a WFA permit, while a WFA order prohibited issuance of permits until the potatoes were inspected in the cars.

Information from the three distribution centers in the south section of the basin, Malin, Merrill and Tulelake, advised that cars were not available "for love or money" and that sorting was again at a standstill.

day's ceremony. He is Brig. Gen. Julius C. Holmes who is now in Paris finishing up his job as deputy to General Eisenhower. He will return here January 15, Stettinius said.

In a formal statement dealing with the reorganization, Stettinius said:

"No stone will be left unturned to make the department strong and fully equipped to discharge its responsibilities in the future."

Today's changes, he added, "should not be considered as a final answer to the department's needs."

Strings Attached

It appeared, however, that some strings were attached to Stettinius' reorganizing authority.

They are (1) an announced presidential promise to fire any who did not follow his policies religiously, and (2) strong insistence in the senate that the department hew closely to the line of the Atlantic charter.

FDR DENIES FORMAL CHARTER EXISTENCE

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20 (AP) A reporter's search for a feature story three weeks ago has now developed into the disclosure by President Roosevelt that the Atlantic Charter does not exist as a formal document.

The reporter, Tom Reedy of the Associated Press, wrote on November 28 that nobody then at the White House, library or congress or the state department seemed at all sure where the charter was.

Reedy suggested an ad in the "lost and found" column.

Senator Chandler (D-Ky.) read the story and raised the question in the senate.

Mr. Roosevelt held his first news conference since November 27 yesterday and told inquiring reporters that the nearest thing to an original probably was in the hands of radio operators who transmitted the charter terms from a 1941 Roosevelt-Churchill meeting in the Atlantic.
