

# TULE GROWERS MAKE PLANS FOR ACTIVE YEAR

Directors Fred McMurphy and John Coulson, whose terms expired this month, were unanimously re-elected at a meeting of the Tulelake growers which was held at the Tulelake high school on Monday, December 11, at 7:30 p. m. A committee of five was appointed to work with the directors in solving the problem of obtaining finances for the organization, as money obtained from contract labor is temporary. The committee includes D. A. Snyder, Melvin Cushman, Clark Fousler, Ivan Rose and Bill Kandra. A rising vote of thanks was given the officers and directors for their efforts during the past year, as well as a letter of appreciation from the Modoc Farm center, thanking the organization for its assistance during the year.

The advertising of crops, as well as new crops for this area, was discussed during the meeting.

A vote was carried to have restrictions on the government lease land as follows: 4000 acres of soil-building crops to be planted the following year, and potatoes not to be grown on the same land two years in succession.

A report was given on the year's work, and the beneficial projects of the organization were discussed thoroughly. There was a general feeling of the need of a strong organization, especially following the end of the war.

## OFFICIALS HOME FROM CORVALLIS

C. A. Henderson, county agent, George Peters, county 4-H club agent, Mrs. Winnifred K. Gillen, county home demonstration agent, and J. R. McCambridge, assistant county agent, returned Saturday from the annual staff conference of Oregon State college at Corvallis.

The conference included the extension service, experiment station and some members of the resident instruction staff. The meetings lasted from December 12-15 inclusive.

The conference was highlighted by several speakers of national importance including Harry Wellman, head of the Glanville foundation located in conjunction with the University of California at Berkeley, Dr. James Millar, field representative of the Oregon Council of Churches in Portland, who spoke on "Citizenship."

S. B. Hall, Multnomah county agent, who has just returned from Argentina where he judged dairy cattle at the Argentina Agricultural society show, discussed Argentine agriculture, and Dr. A. L. Strand, president of Oregon State college, talked on postwar educational problems facing educational institutions of the nation and particularly the needs of Oregon to meet postwar conditions.

In addition, many staff members discussed various types of agricultural subject matter before the group. Small groups also met in special meetings to consider pertinent problems such as farm labor and the war food program.

## RENT FORMS SENT BY OPA EXAMINER

Tenants of private homes or apartments who have not as yet received their copies of the registration form required under office of price administration rent regulations should inform the local rent office at once, Marvin Hixon, examiner for the Klamath Falls area, advised today.

Where the tenant notifies OPA that his registration form has not arrived, word will be sent to the landlord advising him of the law in such cases, the rent examiner explained, adding that the regulations protect the tenant from "revenge" eviction if it is attempted by such landlords.

Hixon's request does not apply to residents of hotels or rooming houses, he added, since in such units, governed under a separate regulation, the landlord is required to post his rates in all rooms and no tenant registration copy is provided.

## Move for New County Opens in Lane, Douglas Sections

EUGENE, Dec. 20 (AP) — A movement to create a new county from parts of western Lane and Douglas counties was reported here today.

Charles L. Graden, Florence, said a meeting has been held to consider the matter, and that another will be held. Graden said residents of the areas involved feel they have not been given enough recognition by county courts in road, bridge and other matters.

## Aeronautics Board Seeks Resumption Of Private Flying

PORTLAND, Dec. 20 (AP) — The Oregon state board of aeronautics declared today that return of Japanese-Americans to the west coast shows conditions here are now safe enough to resume private flying.

The board urged lifting of the ban on civilian fliers in order to green-light a proposed program of flying expansion in the state. Proposals include additional landing fields at 10-mile intervals along the Columbia gorge from Troutdale to The Dalles, and an emergency landing field at Meacham to aid flying between Pendleton and La Grande.

The board also plans an air marking program and closer cooperation with communities on airports.
