LICENSE FEES CITY REVENUE

Additional revenue for the city of kiamath Falis will be gained through higher license tees from various business enterprises, pidces of amusement, slaughter houses and from the gallonage tax, it was decided at a meeting of the city council Tuesday night.

For the first time, theatres will pay a city license fee, the amount depending upon the seating capacity of the house. Theatres with a capacity up to 450 seats will pay an annual fee of \$50; from 450 to 900 seats, \$75; over 900 seats, \$100.
