York also have the word freedom attached to their titles—Polish, Russian, internationalist, what not.

But what is this "freedom" for which we yearn? It must be something different from that freedom which we have had.

Messrs. Roosevelt and Churchill specified four freedoms in the mislaid Atlantic charter. While they were generally approved they have proved hard to get, either for this country or the world.

Freedom of speech and expression, and freedom of religion (both of which we already have and know well), freedom from want, meaning (he said) "economic understandings which will secure to every nation a healthy, peaceful life," and freedom from fear, meaning (he said) "a worldwide reduction of armaments to such a point that no nation can commit aggression."

These are things we want. But to seek freedom from want, must we abandon all other freedoms? Are we free if we are told by a federal government run by political (and therefore amenable) men where to work, how long, for how much?

Wrong in First Place
SOME people actually think that would be freedom. They reason that the employe is now enslaved to the employer, so they wish to rush from his arms into the arms of the state.

Does disarmament mean freedom? We had it before, and we were attacked. France and Britain were supposed to maintain complete disarmament of Germany and we had strict naval arms limitation with Japan.
