In all my experience I have never had anything affect me like this case, because I feel that we have here the man responsible for this baby's existence and I don't want to let him escape if we can prevent it."

Superior Judge Henry M. Wills directed Scott to proceed with his argument, but when Joan's attorney cited another case in which a man had been held to be the father of a child despite medical testimony to the contrary, Millikan again objected. The court again refused to interfere.
