

### TER OBJECTS TO SETTLEMENT PLAN

LONDON, Jan. 11 (AP)—King of Yugoslavia in a delay of communication tonight announced objections to the settlement of Premier Dr. Ivanovic and Marshal Tito to Yugoslavia's constitution.

The first objection concerned the provisions of a proposed regency, the second the anti-fascist clause of national liberation and the third the restricted legislative power until a constituent assembly had completed its work.

The latter provision, the king said, "suggests the transfer of power in Yugoslavia to a single political group."

At a press conference at Belgrade, Yugoslavia's king said he would have rejected the plan for a regency had it been presented at the last minute, but reports circulated that the Minister Churchill had prevailed upon the king to issue that statement.

### Young Gunman Gets 20-Year Sentence

BAKER, Ore., Jan. 11 (AP)—Timothy Berkeley of Utah, who was arrested in Baker by local state police officers January 4 after a running gun battle and an automobile chase, today was sentenced by Circuit Judge F. L. Hubbard to not more than 20 years in the Oregon state penitentiary. Berkeley pleaded guilty to a charge of assault with intent to kill.

His companion, Clarence Harlan, of Visalia, Calif., who was wounded in the gun battle died here Saturday night. His body was sent to Visalia where his parents live.

Both Berkeley and Harlan were escaped prisoners from an Emmett, Idaho jail.

### Petty Officer's Wife Jailed for Leaving Three Children Alone

SEATTLE, Jan. 11 (AP)—Mrs. Treffon Nicholas, 23, wife of a naval officer serving in England, today began a 30-day jail term for leaving her three children, the eldest 6, in an unheated cabin and with only a bowl of gelatin for food, December 29.

She said that on the particular occasion, she went shopping, met some friends and was astonished when she came home the next afternoon, to find that neighbors had not been caring for her children. The youngsters now are with their paternal grandparents, Justice Evangeline Starr was informed. They were taken from the cabin by sheriff's deputies, who were summoned by neighbors.
