## CONSTRUCTION OF NEW CHURCH PLANNED HERE

A permit to construct a \$45,000 church at Home and Martin, was granted the Church of Jesus Christ, Latter Day Saints, at Monday night's council meeting. This is the largest permit granted since declaration of war.

Plans for the church building were drawn up by the church architect in Sait Lake City, and call for a one-story structure with a large chapel flanked by a recreation hall which will include class rooms, kitchen and other facilities.

Members of the local church obtained lumber for the proposed building when they purchased a drying shed from Algoma Lumber company, dismantled the shed and moved the lumber to the grounds.

Priority for construction was obtained through WPB because the lumber, totaling some 200,000 board feet, was on the ground at the time the permit was sought, and also because much of the labor has been donated.

Under the provision, the church must break ground by February 1. Members said they hoped to be in the new building by early summer. E. E. Burrows is chairman of the building committee, and G. W. Hanson is chairman of the finance committee.

## NEW PRESIDENT OF UNIVERSITY NAMED

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 15 (P)—Dr. Harry K. Newburn, 39-year-old dean of the University of Iowa college of liberal arts, will take office as president of the University of Oregon July 1.

Newburn's election was announced by the Oregon state board of higher education after a year's canvassing of American educators. The university has been under the acting presidency of Dr. Orlando J. Hollis, acting law school dean, since the death of President Donald M. Erb in December, 1943.

Dr. Newburn, a native of Illinois, holds a PhD from the university of Iowa, and has been dean of the college of lib-

## COASTING AREAS OUTLINED IN CITY

Recognizing the fact that children will coast on city streets regardless of areas planned on nearby hills, E. E. Hambrick, newly-appointed city recreation officer, has gone to work making plans for safeguarding certain sections where boys and girls will be permitted to coast.

"Coasting on any public street is potentially dangerous," Hambrick stated Tuesday, "but the city administration recognizes the fact that when it is good coasting weather the children will coast."  
"In trying to minimize acci-

idents, the recreation department will place traffic signs at certain intersections where there will be some effort to protect the coasters. The public is urged to watch for these signs and also for the Boy Scouts who will be empowered as traffic officers," Hambrick concluded.

Signs will be placed for coasting on Wilford street west of the cemetery from Delta to Fulton; Washington from First to Third; at Second and Lincoln, and in the Hot Springs area at LeRoy street with stop signs at Eldorado.
