

KLAMATH TOPS STATE IN E BOND SALES

Of the four counties in Oregon having the largest quota of "E" bonds in the 6th War Loan drive, Klamath county ranked first with 135.4 per cent, Marion county with 129.1 per cent, Multnomah county with 112.9 per cent, and Lane county with 111 per cent.

With the release of these final figures on the 6th War Loan drive, the Lion's club extended its sincere thanks to Myrtle Adams, chairman of this drive, and to each member of the executive committee, as well as to the county and city workers.

"The 6th War Loan was not an easy drive to put over, because it was on during the Christmas holidays, and at a time when many of the large purchasers had already bought their quota of bonds for the year of 1944. Despite these obstacles, the drive was very successful, and Klamath county reached and exceeded its quota on every type of bond," according to Paul Skeen, president of the Lions club.

The citizens of Klamath county purchased bonds amounting to \$1,516,600, and "E" bond purchases totaled \$1,218,900 of this sum. Corporations purchased \$2,325,100, making a grand total of \$3,841,700, or 123.9 per cent of the quota.

STOCKMAN URGES DRAFT AMONG ARMY

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17 (AP) Rep. Stockman (R-Ore.) suggests that leaders of the armed forces "do some selecting and drafting of manpower within their own organizations."

The Oregon farmer also told the house yesterday that, in a recent trip to Europe he saw young Belgians and Frenchmen idling their time away who would seem to be better off fighting for their country.

Stockman did not object, specifically, to the drafting of farm labor as proposed recently by the administration. He said, however, that "each man should be assigned to the task where he is best fitted and where he can render the greatest service to his country."

Portland Red Cross Blood Center Fails To Meet '44 Quota

PORTLAND, Jan. 17 (AP) — Portland's Red Cross blood donor center collected 123,056 pints of blood for plasma for the armed forces in 1944, but was slightly below its quota for the year.

Officials said today the 52-week average was 2366 pints against a quota of 2500 pints. They declared the record compared favorably on all counts with those of the nation's 30 other centers.

SERVICE MEN NOT OREGON RESIDENTS

SALEM, Jan. 17 (AP)—Men of the armed forces who come to Oregon cannot establish legal residence in Oregon, the state supreme court ruled Tuesday.

The decision, upholding dismissal of the case by Circuit Judge Walter L. Tooze of Multnomah county, came in the divorce suit of Richard H. Zimmerman, in the navy and stationed at Swan Island, against Betty Jane Zimmerman.

They were married three years ago at Washington courthouse, Ohio, and he was drafted while a resident of that city.

Charging desertion, he sued for divorce in Multnomah county, claiming Oregon as his legal residence.

The supreme court's unanimous decision, by Justice James T. Brand, said a person, such as a member of the armed forces, cannot acquire a new legal residence because he is under legal and physical compulsion by the United States government.

"Where one in military service dwells upon a reservation which is on land ceded to the United States, it has been held that he cannot acquire domicile in that state for the reason that which has ceased to be a part of the state," the court said.

Newspaper Work Still On Essential List

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17 (AP) Employment on newspapers and in press association and news syndicate work was continued in the "essential" classification today as the government revised its list of war-important activities.

This means that occupationally deferred newspapermen 26 through 29 will be called up in the draft ahead of registrants in activities given a "critical" designation in the revision.

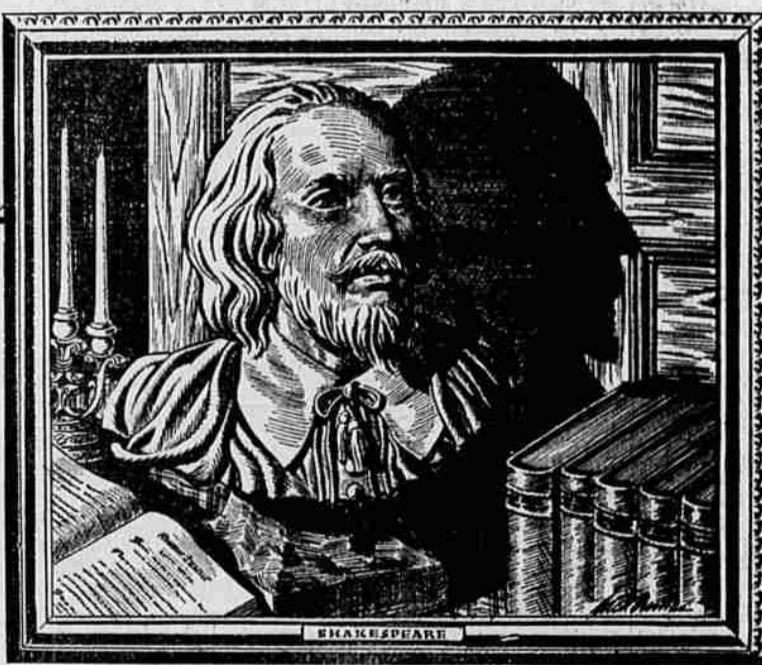
The only activities in the general communications category singled out as critical are:

Military, naval and technical charts and maps; instructional and technical manuals; radio communications (radio-telephone and radio-telegraph); cable service (land or submarine); telegraph, and telephone.
