AIR MEDAL GIVEN
 HEADQUARTERS 10TH AIR FORCE IN BURMA—Award of the Air Medal to 2nd Lt. Lawrence J. Schmitz, 21, son of William Schmitz, 317 Lincoln, Klamath Falls, has been announced by Maj. Gen. Howard C. Davidson, commanding general, 10th air force, EAC.

A pilot for the second troop carrier squadron of the 10th air force that operates against the Japs in the India-Burma theater, Lt. Schmitz has been in the armed forces 20 months, having spent the past four months in this theater of operations. He has to his credit 180 combat flying hours.

BALDOCK BATTLES
 Classifying himself as the ninth cook of an eight-man kitchen crew, T/5 Marshall D. Baldock, whose wife is now a resident of Klamath Falls, fought his way through Normandy, northern France and into Germany behind the wheel of a kitchen truck. It can now be officially disclosed.

While his present whereabouts cannot be revealed for reasons of military security, T/5 Baldock arrived in France, June 11, with the 188th field artillery battalion, when the American beachhead was still uncomfortably small. He participated in the breakthrough in the St. Lo area, which resulted in the race across France, entered Belgium, September 3, and on the 10th of the same month, drove his truck through a blown out section of the dragon's teeth tank blocks which mark the German frontier.

MARCHESE AWARDED
 Pvt. Reno A. Marchese, son of Attilio Marchese, Pelican City, is a member of the 81st "Wildcat" infantry division and has been awarded a combat infantryman badge for exemplary conduct and skill in action against the enemy. The "Wildcat" division recently invaded the southern islands of the Japanese-held Palau group, 500 miles east of the Philippines.
