

TRUCK EXTENDED TO JULY, '47

ALBANY, Jan. 25 (AP)—The senate and house highway committees today indicated they would extend the law authorizing large trucks to operate on state roads, but that they would favor making the larger limit permanent.

The permanent truck limits are 50 feet long and 54,000 lbs. in weight but, during the war, the trucks may be up to 60 feet long and 71,250 pounds.

Chairman T. H. Banfield of the state highway commission said the committees at yesterday's public hearing to fix July 1, 1947, as the date for expiration of the wartime limits.

L. Potter of Oregon State said that livestock movements are hindered because of truck limits in lower states. Banfield explained there are stretches on the coast highway where it is unsafe to operate school trucks.

Frank S. Clay, secretary-man of the Portland traffic association, said Oregon is losing business in Idaho and Washington because the larger trucks in those states result in lower costs, thus lower freight rates. King operators said that under the big truck limits are made permanent, they could not compete in the post-war period with trucks in neighboring states.

B. Sanders of the Oregon highway association opposed larger post-war limits.

Army Establishes Advance Station
YOKERIN, Calif., Jan. 25.—The navy, in its relentless search for new and more efficient weapons, is establishing a 200,000-ordnance test station here in the spacious Mojave desert for large-scale development of rockets and other instruments of war.

Capt. Sherman E. Burroughs, commanding officer, announced that the new Yokerin camp, located on 656,000 acres of government land, will carry research on such a scale America never again will be surprised, technologically, by her war.

CALIFORNIANS EYE PUBLIC HEALTH BILL

SACRAMENTO, Jan. 25 (AP)—With bills pouring in at a rate of more than 300 a day, the legislature drove ahead today striving for adjournment of the first portion of the 56th session by late Saturday night or Sunday.

Governor Warren's forerunners brought their compulsory health insurance bill over the first hurdle by getting a limitation set upon the period of deliberation

which can be accorded the measure by a joint committee comprised of the assembly public health and the senate governmental efficiency standing committees.

Providing the senate and assembly concur, this joint committee must report its findings on the subject by April 15. The action was taken by the assembly rules committee through amendment of a resolution authored by Assemblyman Frederick H. Kraft, (R), chairman of the house public health committee, after a stormy meeting at which proponents of the bill charged foes of the health program sought its defeat by delay.

Less propitious for the Warren program, however, was the introduction of a \$30,000,000 rural highway bill bearing the names of 31 senators headed by Senator George Hatfield (R) Merced county, as authors. The financing would cut into

funds earmarked, on the governor's recommendation, for a post war employment reserve. Likewise the move, formidable because of its many sponsors, would compete with the proposal of the state chamber of commerce and other civic organizations for a 15-year super highway network of freeways and express arterials.

The rural highway measure would apportion funds to counties as a subsidy on the basis of rural road mileage and population. Hatfield said, however, he may amend his measure to provide the money on a matching basis.

Victory Gardeners Assured of Seeds

PORTLAND, Jan. 25 (AP)—Northwest victory gardeners were assured today of enough vegetable seeds for a varied 1945 crop despite a shortage of cucumbers, most squash, and tomatoes.

Ray W. Gill, former state grange master and seed dealer, said seed handlers have more corn and peas than last year, with a sufficient supply of cabbage, beets, carrots, rutabagas and turnips.
