DISCUSS FARM
OUTPUT GOALS

gricultural production goals
for 1945 will be discussed at a
meeting Thursday, February 1,
at the AAA committee. Rep-
resentatives of various depart-
ments of agriculture, members
of the war board, and chairmen
of county agricultural organi-
zations, at the chamber of com-
merce directors' room starting at
10 a. m.

The session will last all day.
Representatives of the state
and extension service will
be present to discuss national
state production goals, price
controls, and facilities for pro-
duction such as farm labor,
transportation, farm machinery,
pesticides, and other matters
of importance.

Discussions will include an
outline of conservation practices
effective in 1945 and adaption of
practices to local conditions.

Fireman Killed
Train, Car Crash

Donald Branstetter, Southern
Bell fireman and son of Mrs.
Branstetter of Dunsuir, was
killed January 20, when an
engine was struck by a fuel
truck at Chowchilla. Bran-
stetter was engineer on the
engine and well-known to local
road men.

According to information from
Dunsuir, the truck caught fire
being struck and scattered
oil over the locomotive.
The shepherd, fireman, resident
of Dunsuir, and a Mr. Carter,
owner of the truck, were also
in the crash. Branstetter
was 38 years of age and a long-
time resident of Dunsuir.

License Fees Said
Outstanding by Clerk

License fees for 1945 were due
January 1, and out of 350 firms
only 54 are outstanding.
According to the city clerk's of-
