INVESTIGATION OF SODOMY CASE HELD

The district attorney's office today continued the investigation into the sodomy charge placed against Edward William Goedert, 47, Merrill, and action against the valley resident was withheld pending further study, District Attorney Clarence A. Humble stated.

In the meantime, Goedert is in the Klamath county jail. He is a former Merrill restaurant operator and was arrested at Tulelake, February 3. Parents of the 7-year-old boy involved appeared at the district attorney's office Wednesday and gave statements bearing on the case. Goedert had not been arraigned late Thursday.

State Urged to Pass Pasteurization Bill

PORTLAND, Feb. 8 (AP)—The state legislature was urged to pass laws immediately requiring the proper pasteurization of all milk in Oregon, in a resolution unanimously endorsed by the Multnomah county medical society last night.

The doctors asked that pending dairy and meat legislation be referred for study to committees on medicine, dentistry, and pharmacy. The society demanded that legislators also place "the legally constituted health authorities of Oregon" in control of health aspects of the meat and dairy industries.
