

Conservation Plan Aid in Continued Production of Food

Klamath county farmers will find the 1945 agricultural conservation program especially helpful toward continued food production. It is designed to encourage, on privately owned farm lands, the adoption of proven farming practices, help produce food and feed efficiently, at the same time maintaining soil fertility, and reducing soil and water wastage and losses. Such practices are particularly needed after three years of record wartime output.

The program offers 41 practices each of demonstrated direct practical value and nearly all practices offered in 1944 have been continued. These practices have been recommended by farmer county and community committeemen and so chosen that a farmer on any type of a farm or ranch will find practices adapted to his conservation needs.

For 1945, no individual farm allowances will be established. A fixed allocation of funds will limit the amount of payments that can be earned by all farmers in the state. For that reason careful planning of each farm's participation in the program is necessary to achieve the maximum in conservation for each dollar in payment.

Every farmer or rancher taking part in the program is required to complete a farm plan form and payment will be made for only those practices listed on that farm plan and approved by the county committee. This form serves as a declaration of intention to participate in the conservation program and also serves as an inventory of crop acreages and livestock production. It is the only means of estimating whether national food production goals will be met or whether it will be necessary to ask producers to make

any shifts in farm goals to balance production needs on a county, state, or national basis.

Farmers will be asked to sign up their farm plans at the AAA office, room 207, Federal building, this year. Community committeemen will be on hand to assist farmers in each of the communities on the dates listed as follows:

Merrill, Malin—February 19 and 20 from 9:30 a. m. to 4:30 p. m.

Henley, Keno, Midland, Rocky Point—February 21 and 23 from 9:30 a. m. to 4:30 p. m.

Bonanza, Poe Valley, Bly, Sprague River—February 26 and 27 from 9:30 a. m. to 4:30 p. m.

Fort Klamath, Algoma, Modoc Point—February 28 and March 1 from 9:30 a. m. to 4:30 p. m.

All farmers who possibly can be asked to come in on the days listed for his community.

AAA CLEARS UP CCC LOAN POLICY HERE

Since there appears to be a mistaken idea in some quarters regarding the commodity credit corporation loan policy, AAA committeemen have been asked to advise producers that CCC prefers not to take title to commodities under loan. Burrell Short, chairman of the county AAA committee reports.

It is the policy of CCC to encourage producers to redeem their loans on any commodity whenever they can realize a return equal to or in excess of the loan plus carrying charges, or in the case of wheat when the return will equal or exceed the net amount from the parity purchase price offered for wheat remaining under loan on May 1, 1945. Mr. Short said. The parity purchase price on wheat is the loan value plus 15 cents a bushel, less all carrying charges to the end of the storage year.

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DR. ADAMS BUYS JUNIOR HERD SIRE

FARMERS GIVEN EDGE

Treasury procurement has announced that preference will be given to agriculture in sale of used crawler tractors declared surplus by the armed forces and other government agencies. The tractors are sold to dealers on a sealed bid basis. Because of the demand, most bids are at the ceiling. In case of tie bids, preference will be given to farmers buying for resale to farmers holding letters of necessity issued by AAA committees.

WON'T SOLVE PROBLEM

Farmers' transportation problems will not be entirely solved by the new trucks scheduled for production in 1945, district ODT officials point out in a recent letter to AAA committee-men. A total of 35,904 pickups and 110,114 medium trucks have been authorized for production schedules. Even if all of the trucks were manufactured and none were taken by the army, the total number would fill less than a fourth of ODT's estimated essential civilian requirements.

Gen. Marshall Visits 5th Army Sectors in Italy

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY IN ITALY, Feb. 15 (AP)—Gen. George C. Marshall, making a surprise tour of the Italian front, told fifth army soldiers yesterday that they have immobilized large German forces in Italy, preventing these Nazi troops from bolstering sagging lines on the eastern and western fronts.

It is estimated the Nazis have 27 divisions in Italy.

Marshall's statement was an obvious tonic to the fifth army troops, many of whom have been overseas battling the axis more than three years.

The U. S. army chief of staff made an unexpected, three-day tour of the fifth's sector on his way home from the Crimean conference. He wore overalls for the first time his new five-star insignia as a general of the army.

It was Marshall's first visit to the Italian front since last year and he made 15 stops, including a trip to the place the Germans called "Death Valley" since the Germans threw 1500 rounds of ammunition at it last December. It still is a my-held hill.

Later the same afternoon Marshall scrambled up a rugged trail to a forward observation post from which he saw virtually the entire sector of the fifth army front. He gave officers and men here all the way from the front lines to the rear echelons the way from the picture of plans for the German.

As his tour ended, Marshall said: "Such a spirit of comradeship, such teamwork, makes the destruction of German military powers."

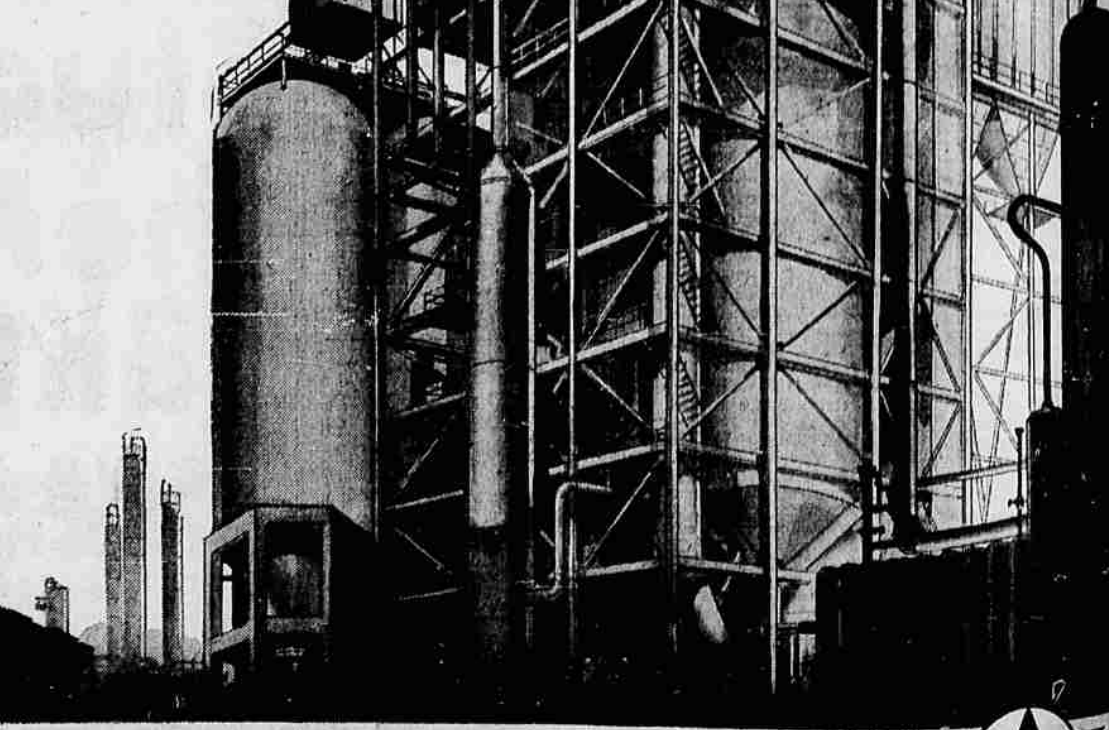
