NEW PRO NAMED AT AIR STATION

Lt. (jg) Joseph Lockwood Holst has taken over duties of the public relations officer at the Klamath naval air station, replacing Lt. (jg) W. H. Campbell who continues his duties as station liaison officer.

Holst is a native of Charleston, S. C., and will round out 28 years of active service in the United States navy in April. He has been at the Klamath station since December 4, 1944, serving as station secretary and prior to that time was at the naval auxiliary air station at Rodd field, Corpus Christi, Tex., where he served for 10 months. Holst was sent to Corpus Christi following 101 years of sea duty. He was at Pearl Harbor on the USS New Orleans, December 7, 1941, and following the declaration of war, took part in nine major engagements in the South Pacific, including the Battle of the Coral Sea, Midway, and various battles in the Solomons.

Man Wounded Twice In Battle Killed After Discharge

PORTLAND, Feb. 15 (P)—Steve R. Oreskovich, 36, wounded on the Anzio beachhead and again in another Italian battle, was discharged last October 30 with the Purple Heart.

Back home here with his bride of less than a month, Oreskovich was killed by a 4000-pound raft which crashed upon him as he was loading a ship at the docks.

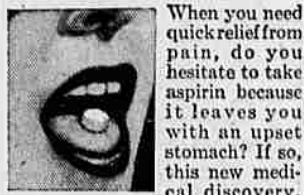
SAFETY TRAINING CLASSES SET HERE

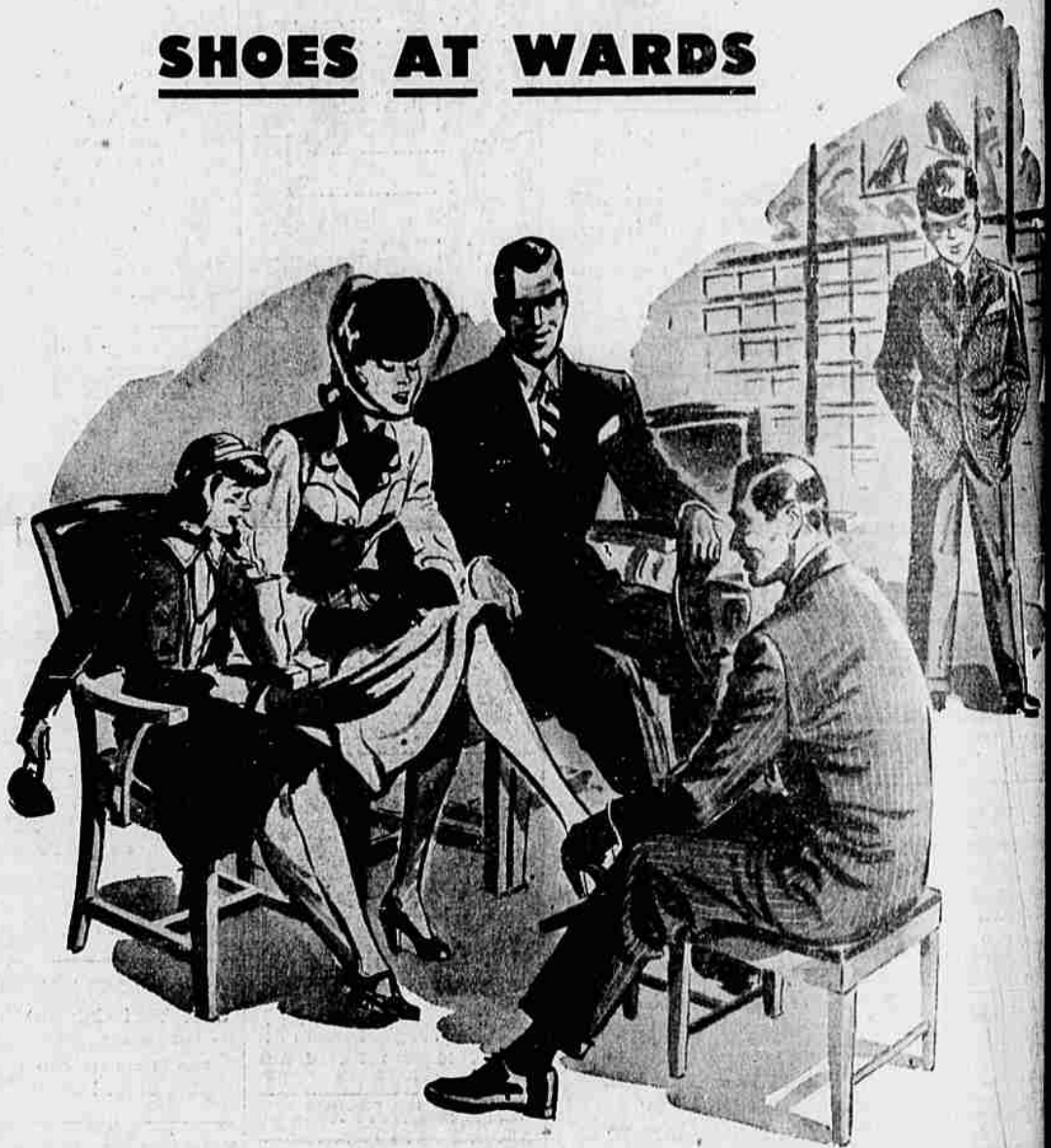
