

COMMITTEEMEN SELECTED FOR SALVAGE DRIVE

Committeemen for the forthcoming county-wide salvage drive on paper, tin cans, and waste fats were appointed last night at a brief meeting of salvage heads at the chamber of commerce.

Marvin Hixon was named publicity coordinator; Eldred Putnam, radio publicity; Paul Haines, newspaper; Annabelle Newton, city woman chairman; R. H. Lamott, Boy Scouts; Wyatt Padgett, representative of suburban schools; Paul Deller, representative of city schools; Bob Chilcote, in charge of facilities, such as salvage depots, etc.; Maurice Miller, secretary of the city salvage committee; and Bill Kunz, salvage chairman for the Junior chamber of commerce.

Warren Whitlock is city salvage chairman and Paul Lee is county executive salvage chairman. The drive will be divided into two phases: one the actual saving of material, and the other to deal with collecting the salvage. A central salvage depot will be constructed in the 500 block on Market and there will be four or five subsidiary stations throughout the city.

The Boy Scouts will stage a paper drive in conjunction with the national Boy Scout program throughout the entire month of March, but this will not conflict with the local drive. These specific county drives are March 12-17 on tin cans, March 19-24 on paper, and March 26-31 on waste fats. Materials must be turned in to salvage depots not later than the last day of each designated week in rural districts and, most important, the Sunday following each specified week is pick-up day in immediate suburban and city areas.

The Western front: Canadian first army offensive reached Rhine opposite Emmerich, closed in on Nazi bastions of Goch and Clacur under heavy air support; U. S. third army gained mile in bridgehead area south of captured Pruem.

The Russian front: Konev reported 53 miles from bomb-battered Dresden as allied planes continued to blast targets in his path in unprecedented air offensive; battle raged for Neisse bridgehead, Moscow reported; other prong reported joining Zhukov's forces west of the Oder.

The Italian front: German jabs pressed back American outposts on coastal sector but ground later was regained.

The Pacific front: Superfortresses blasted Honshu targets; Americans tightened death noose on enemy in southern part of Manila; Americans on Bataan advanced down east coast in bitter fighting; bombing of Corregidor continued; Chinese in Burma drove within 48 miles of Lashio.

Dimes Receipts Near \$6000 Mark In County

The total gross receipts on the "March of Dimes" drive for the national infantile paralysis fund in Klamath county is \$5952.50 to date. These official figures were released Wednesday by Roy Rakestraw, treasurer of the drive in Klamath county.

This does not include bottle collections, which are just beginning to come in, or theatre receipts. It is expected that the theatre proceeds will run close to \$1500 and additional collections from bottles should run close to \$400. The quota for the county is \$8200 and it seems extremely likely that goal will be reached when all receipts are in. Total theatre collections will probably not be in for another two months, Rakestraw said.

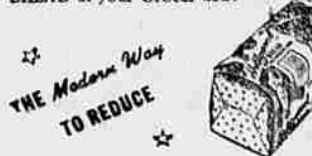

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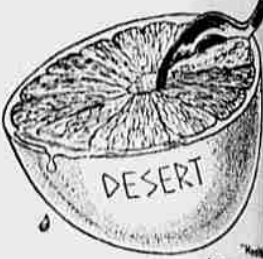
