

# THOUSAND TROOPS LOST ON WEST FRONT

WASHINGTON, Feb. 15 (AP)—The ground forces on the western front lost 394,874 men during the last week of the year, according to a report today. The report reflected an increase in casualties on the western front in January, in which 61,962 were killed, 41,325 wounded and 11,789 missing. Simultaneously, Stimson reported that the army's casualties in all theaters since the beginning of the war now are 2,348,342 on the basis of names compiled in Washington through January 7 and reflecting casualties in the early part of the year.

Linked with the navy's latest report of losses of 88,838, this total American combat losses at 782,180, an increase of 2,286 since last week's report. The breakdown on army casualties in this week's report and corresponding figures for last week follow:

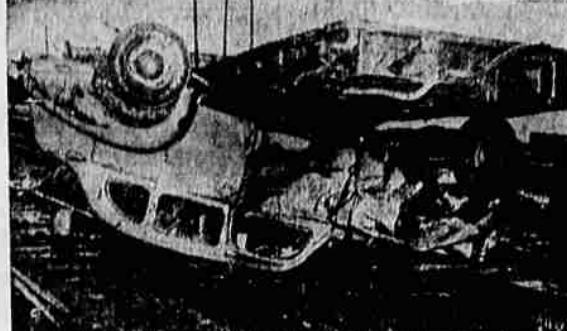
Killed 135,510 and 130,266; Wounded 498,553 and 398,178; Missing 58,536 and 58,878; Missing 90,723 and 91,476.

Stimson reported that 202,813 of the wounded have returned to duty. Similar figures for the navy are:

Killed 33,536 and 33,192; Wounded 40,607 and 40,248; Missing 4474 and 4475; Missing 10,221 and 9873.

The decline in the number of prisoners by the army is navy presumably represents shifting to other classifications.

## 41ST DIVISION GIVEN CITATION

SEATTLE, Feb. 15 (AP)—The 41st division added further laurels yesterday with the announcement from division headquarters in the Pacific that it had received its third Presidential Unit citation.

The 41st, originally composed of national guardsmen of Oregon, Idaho and Washington, is the oldest division in the army in this war in point of overseas service (34 months).

It also holds the record for continuous jungle fighting—76 consecutive days and nights at one time last year.

## D. A. Seizes Radio Equipment From Ship

PORTLAND, Feb. 15 (AP)—The United States district attorney's office today had disclosed seizure of \$700 worth of radio equipment from the captain and crew of a Russian ship just before it sailed.

U. S. Deputy District Attorney Mason Dillard petitioned federal court for a warrant to seize the articles, although they already are confiscated. He said a customs officer became suspicious and seized the articles under a ruling affecting items barred from export to foreign countries.

## BILL TO SUSPEND COLLEGE PROPOSED

OLYMPIA, Feb. 15 (AP)—A bill to suspend operation of Eastern Washington College of Education and utilize its facilities for establishment of a state school for delinquent children was introduced to the Washington legislature today by Sen. Howard S. Bargreen (D-Snohomish).

The proposal asks that the building, grounds and facilities of the Cheney college be made available for the new school at the end of the current school year.

It would authorize the director of the state department of finance, budget and business to transfer the college teaching staff and students to other state colleges or the University of Washington.

Restoration of EWC would be contingent on further order of the legislature.

**Party hints...**

Party time means eating time to young and old alike. Here are some new and different suggestions that add sparkle to any gathering.

**HOT SCONES**  
2 cups all-purpose flour 1 tbsp. grated orange or lemon rind  
3 tbsps. baking powder 1 egg  
1/2 tsp. salt 1 cup Milk  
2 tbsps. sugar 2 tbsps. orange or lemon juice  
6 tbsps. shortening

Sift flour; measure; sift again with baking powder, salt, and 1 tbsp. of the sugar into mixing bowl. Cut in shortening with pastry blender or 2 knives. Add orange or lemon rind. Beat egg with fork in measuring cup and add milk to make 1/2 cup; add to flour mixture; stir quickly and lightly just until all flour is dampened. Turn onto lightly floured board; knead 20 to 30 seconds; roll or pat into 9-inch circle about 1/2 inch thick. Place in ungreased 9-inch round cake pan; mark into 8 wedges with fork tines; brush top with orange or lemon juice; sprinkle with remaining sugar. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) 15 minutes, or until done. Serves 8.

**CREAMED TUNA, HAM OR CHICKEN**  
4 tbsps. shortening 2 cups flaked tuna, ham, or chicken  
4 tbsps. all-purpose flour 2 tbsps. finely cut parsley  
2 cups milk or chicken broth 2 tbsps. finely diced pimiento  
1/4 tsp. salt 2 tbsps. grated onion

Make white sauce in double boiler: Melt shortening; blend in flour; add milk or broth gradually; cook until thickened, stirring frequently. Add remaining ingredients; heat thoroughly. Serves 6.

**ICE CREAM PUFFS**  
Peppermint treat

Roll balls of vanilla ice cream in crushed peppermint candy. Serve plain or with chocolate sauce.
