**Bill Protects Users Of Water From Excess Payments**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16 (AP)—Legislation designed to protect reclamation project water users from excess payments has won the approval of the house irrigation and reclamation committee.

Chairman Murdock (D-Ariz.) reported that under the measure only those expenses specifically incurred in operation of particular projects will be charged to the users. This is achieved by taking from the general reclamation office of the bureau of reclamation, the regional offices and the cost of investigations.

The committee also approved a bill to give preference on newly-irrigated lands of the Boulder canyon project to World War II veterans.

**CONSTRUCTION NEED AT ADAIR STUDIED**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16 (AP)—New construction needs at Camp Adair, between Corvallis and Albany, Ore., are under review by the navy, which has taken over the camp hospital. Senator Cordon (R-Ore.) said today.

Original plans were to build a new hospital, cold storage plant, and five buildings for officers' quarters. But the navy has advised Cordon another survey of available officers' quarters will be made, and the present cold storage plant and laundry—if this can be operated in part—will be utilized.

Secretary Forrestal, in explaining new construction plans, wrote that navy officials first thought the army still would use part of the camp, hence extra hospital facilities would be needed. The regular camp facilities are too far from the hospital and too large, he said.

**Nimitz Writes Out Official Communique On Tokyo Pounding**

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 16 (AP)—Admiral Chester W. Nimitz was so interested in the attack on Tokyo that he wrote out the official communique himself, in long hand, said an NBC broadcast by Robert McCormick from Guam.

But the historic communique is missing. Whether it is the property of some souvenir hunter, or was mistakenly tossed into the waste basket, no one knows.

**O'Connor to Report On Red Cross Work**

PORTLAND, Feb. 16 (AP)—A report on Red Cross services in Europe will be given here today by Basil O'Connor, national chairman of the American Red Cross who recently was overseas.

Verne Simmons, San Francisco, Pacific area Red Cross manager, will accompany him.

**Morse to Discuss State Planning Funds**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 16 (AP)—Senator Morse (R-Ore.) plans to discuss postwar planning funds for states and local communities with members of the senate appropriations committee.

The independent offices bill, approved by the house, allows \$5,000,000, which the League of Oregon Cities has protested as insufficient. The federal works agency had asked \$77,880,000.

The smaller sum, however, was approved by the house committee as an "initial" allowance, pending state legislative action. State measures would give a "fairly accurate picture" as to the demand for such federal aid, members suggested.

The senate committee has not yet begun hearings on the bill.
