WAGONS ROLLING WEST in '49 created a new concept of transportation... have you ever stopped to think? Or maybe it was Columbus that started it, or Marco Polo... anyway, we twentieth century people are reaping the benefits of the idea of life as a continent, instead of just life as a county or community. Take Klamath county, for instance. For the first time this winter, we have been able to buy fresh tomatoes all year 'round. Why? Because transport and storage has been developed to such an extent that we can have, in the middle of winter, tomatoes, first all the way from old Mexico, then from early growing areas in Texas and southern California, then from the central part of the Golden Bear state, then from our Rogue River valley neighbors, and then ones grown in our own victory garden. That goes for bell peppers, avocados, and has been true for some time of the citrus fruits. With the advent of air-freight transport when peaches, strawberries in January will be a fact, not a fancy. No malnutrition for Americans with our present good-neighbor trade relations.

EGG PRICES are dropping, egg supplies rising, yea, even as it has been prophesied by the OPAs. This coupled with more stringent meat rationing, will cause nutrition-wise homemakers to make even wider use of the fruit of the hen. And that's where a little booklet to be found at the home demonstration office will help out tremendously. It's "Egg Dishes for Any Meal." Any of the 48-odd recipes included in this inspired bit of advice to cooks is guaranteed to perk up the simplest meal... as well as add interest, vitamins, minerals, and proteins to the food you serve your family. MRS. GILLEN SUGGESTS that pressure cooker gauges will need to be tested this spring, before canning begins, just as always, and hopes that homemakers will bring them into the office now.
