

PRESENT MILK SITUATION IN AREA STUDIED

The main topic of discussion at the meeting of the chamber of commerce board of directors Wednesday afternoon concerned the present milk situation in Klamath Falls. A number of dairies have been forced to close within the last 60 days due to the shortage of labor in this area. At the present time, some milk is being shipped to Klamath Falls from Eugene, Yreka and Medford, although there is a possibility that such shipments will be curtailed in the future.

The agricultural committee of the chamber went on record as favoring the senate joint resolution 19 to alleviate the situation. At the Tuesday meeting, the board of directors authorized its approval of the resolution. Director Vern Owens reported that 75 new members have joined during the chamber of commerce membership drive which will close March 1. Owens also expressed the hope that farmers, businessmen and professional men outside the city limits of Klamath Falls would not their names to the drive, pointing out the fact that all interested in the welfare of the county are eligible to join.

A summary of the hearing of the Pit river diversion was also given at this time, and the board authorized the chamber of commerce to purchase a transcript of the proceedings of the hearing.

Tom Dunn, A. W. Downs and J. E. Benbow were three new members present at the meeting. The session was held under the direction of Vice President Fred Heilbronner in the absence of Malcolm Epley, president.

3RD MARINES LAND ON ISLE, BEGIN DRIVE

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throughout the northern part of the island and fleet aircraft supported ground forces with heavy bombing, strafing and rocket attacks.

The veteran third division landed on Iwo at a critical hour bolstering two other hard-pressed divisions with veterans of the invasions of Bougainville and Guam. Maj. Gen. Graves B. Erskine commands the force.

The commitment of three marine divisions in the four-day-old Iwo invasion meant as many as 45,000 men may be either ashore or in the process of being sent against the enemy.

Men of the third, fourth and fifth marine divisions, having sealed off the southern third of Iwo, encountered tough going at the south tip of the island against Japanese on the slopes of Mt. Suribachi and to the north near the island's center in a drive to capture Motoyama airfield No. 2.

Flamethrowers and tanks were sent against enemy pillboxes on the slopes of Mt. Suribachi Wednesday afternoon. The Japanese, who previously had weathered a terrific bombardment by warships of the U. S. fifth fleet, knocked out four of the tanks. The sector is strewn with land mines. East of the volcano, the enemy staged a counterattack in daylight for the first time but it was hurled back.

Aiken Advocates Liberal GOP Bloc

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22 (AP)—Deploping republican opposition to Henry A. Wallace, Senator Aiken (R-Vt.) advocated today the formation of a party bloc "to preserve what liberal element it has left in congress."

The Vermonters, frequently at odds with the GOP leadership in the senate, declared the republicans have "driven most of the young people away from the party."

"It doesn't appeal to the young folks," he told a reporter. "They think we are looking backwards."

Confidence Vote To Be Demanded

LONDON, Feb. 22 (AP)—Prime Minister Churchill said today the government would demand a parliamentary vote of confidence on the joint policy agreed to by the three powers at the Crimean conference, particularly with reference to "unity of action" in peace as in war.

As leader of the house of commons, Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden set down the government motion for the debate for next Tuesday and Wednesday even as the parliamentary lobby buzzed with reports of possible revolt among some members of Churchill's own conservative party over the Polish issue.

OPA Offers New Scheme For Ceilings

PORTLAND, Feb. 22 (AP)—A "kitchen reminder" scheme to combat OPA ceiling prices was recommended today by the OPA labor advisory board.

Cards listing the most common foods would be distributed to 20,000 homes. The housewife takes the card to market, jots down the price paid for each article. If the price is above ceiling, or the purchase proves of inferior quality, she writes her complaint on the card and mails it collect to the OPA.
