VACATION ORDERED LUMBER WORKERS

PORTLAND, Feb. 27 (AP)—The first west coast lumber commission order giving northwest lumber workers their long-demanded two weeks' vacation was issued here today.

In a case brought by the CIO International Woodworkers of America, Willamette Valley Lumber Operators association and Oregon coast operators were directed to grant a two-week vacation to employees of five years' standing. Other employees will continue to receive a one-week vacation.

Vacation pay varies according to the number of hours worked during the year, with five days' wages on each vacation week for men averaging a 22-hour week or more.

Willamette Valley Lumber Operators association includes 45 companies with 4500 employees. Oregon coast operators comprises 10 companies with 1000 employees.
