Canadian 1st army: Canadians and British threatened to burst into western Ruhr basin, as Germans were reported fleeing across Rhine.

British 2nd army: Not reported in offensive as separate entity.

U. S. 9th army: Captures Krefeld and Neuss, suburb of Duesseldorf, in spectacular advances to Rhine.

U. S. 1st army: Near Cologne, blasted by British heavy bombers.

U. S. 3rd army: Captures Trier, key to Moselle valley.

U. S. 7th, French 1st army: No new developments reported.

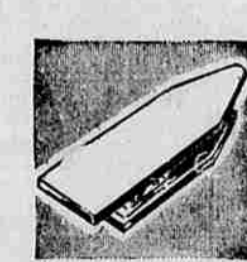
