

FOUR TRAFFIC ARRESTS MADE BY CITY COPS

Klamath motorists still seem prone to violate traffic laws with four arrests made on this charge in the past 24 hours.

Richard Dapper, Marine Barracks, paid a \$3 fine in traffic court this morning for making illegal U-turn and Newton Walker of Klamath Falls posted \$15 bail for violation of the basic rule and having no operator's license.

William Anderson, 435 Alameda, paid a \$5 fine in traffic court Friday afternoon for violation of the basic rule, and Pvt. Donald Olsen, U.S.A. of Klamath Falls, was fined for running a stop sign.

End of Dictatorship Seen In Russia

PORTLAND, March 3 (AP)—A new desire for individual liberty among the Russians, especially the youth, will mean the end of dictatorship in that country, Alexander F. Kerensky predicted here.

Kerensky, one-time premier of Russia after the revolution, said last night increased democracy shown in local governments since the war heralds a new future for Russia. He declared Russia would not be a trouble-maker because of the time needed for rehabilitation. "Russia is fighting a patriotic war, not a war of imperialism," he stated, denying that the Russian government supports to any extent the communists in newly liberated countries.

HIGH SCHOOL HOME EC GROUP PLANNED

PULLMAN, March 3 (AP)—Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana delegates to the first of 12 district meetings today were planning the organization of a new high school home economics group expected to enroll 100,000 members this year throughout the nation.

Dr. Hazel Frost of Washington, D. C., U. S. office of education advisor to the yet unnamed organization, said home economics clubs expected to join the group have 60,000 members in 35 states. Recommendations for a name, constitution and officers of the group are being considered at the Washington State college meeting which opened yesterday, Dr. Frost said. The next regional meeting is scheduled for Berkeley, Calif., Thursday and Friday.

Top Counties Listed In February Drive

PORTLAND, March 3 (AP)—Gilliam, Hood River and Marion counties led in per capita collections during Oregon's February waste paper drive, which netted 1267 tons, the state salvage committee said today.

Marion averaged 50.8 pounds per capita, winning third place and stacking up a total of 1779 tons since November, 1943, when the drive began.

WARM MONTH RECORDED IN KLAMATH AREA

February this year had the warmest mean temperature recorded for the same month since 1941.

This was 37.1 degrees, four degrees warmer than the normal mean temperature for the month.

Highest temperature recorded for the month was 53 degrees on February 19 and 27. There were 20 days with a mean temperature of 32 degrees or lower.

Average maximum temperature for the month was 45.3 degrees, and average minimum was 28.8.

Four bright clear days were recorded for the month. Nine days were only partly cloudy and 15 days recorded as cloudy.

Precipitation recorded during the month was .34 inches more than normal. It was the most precipitation for the month since 1942. The heaviest precipitation for a 24-hour period was .51 inches, recorded February 13.

Heavy precipitation throughout Klamath basin greatly increased the storage in project reservoirs, Laton Stephens, reclamation superintendent, stated. At the close of the month, he said, the available storage in upper Klamath lake was 243,600 acre-feet. Clear lake reservoir 279,730 acre-feet and Gerber reservoir 52,230 acre-feet, making a total of 184,430 acre-feet during January.

Sinatra Disqualified For Military Service

JERSEY CITY, N. J., March 3 (AP)—Crooner Frank Sinatra has been disqualified again for military duty, and classified as engaged in work "necessary to the national health, safety and interest," draft officials announced yesterday.

Ira W. Caldwell, chairman of Sinatra's local draft board, said that if the board had not considered the crooner's work so important it would have marked him "non-essential."

A punctured ear drum, basis of the physical disqualification by military examiners, was the only thing wrong with the crooner, Caldwell said.

Sinatra has been classified 2-A-F until September, he added.
