The War Today

The act of Chapultepec would provide for use of joint force to stifle aggression within the hemisphere, echoes the spirit of the Crimean conference of the Big Three who pledged themselves to peace at all costs.

One of the happiest aspects of the Mexico City conference, from the viewpoint of a Yankee, is that the "act of Chapultepec" originates among our good neighbors and not in the United States.

Venus Can Be Seen During Daylight in Next Few Weeks

By J. HUGH PRUETT Astronomer, General Extension Division, University of Oregon. Panicky reactions are not necessarily in order even should you some fine afternoon spy in the clear blue heavens a tiny white object which strongly suggests a mysterious ballroom at dizzy height.

At the time the sun is at its south-around 1 p. m. westward—note its position in the sky as you stand close to the side of a building. On March 10, Venus will be due south 10 hours later than the sun will be considerably higher in the sky than was the sun in this direction. The difference March 10 will be 2 1/2 hours.

At present this planet is in the orbit at its maximum. Greater brilliancy will be reached March 10. For some time before and after this date, Venus may be seen in the daytime if you know just where to look. It is the procedure.

CITY SNOW REMOVAL NOT GREAT PROBLEM

Snow removal from city streets has not constituted much of a problem this year, according to E. A. Thomas, city engineer, and snow plows have not been needed at any time.

There was a little more snow last year, Thomas said, but even then plows were only utilized once. Traffic has not been hindered to any appreciable extent, he said, but mud conditions on dirt streets have been bad.

Thomas also pointed out that any street improvements to these roads must be financed by abutting property owners.

He warned against overoptimism, however, saying that there may still quite possibly be need for snow removal from the streets before June.

PORTLAND, Ore., March 3 (AP)—Share holders received \$2,468,464 in dividends from Matson Navigation company, which had a net income of \$3,238,869 last year, the annual financial report showed today.

Total assets were listed at \$112,983,095.

The firm soon will apply for its routes to New Zealand and Australia, the statement indicated. Last year the company prepared for air service to and from Hawaii and Portland, Seattle, San Francisco and Los Angeles by application for air transport service over steamship routes.

PORTLAND, Ore., March 3 (AP)—The army engineers are studying the Willamette river basin to draft a final program for a network of dams for flood control and navigation.

The engineers said today that some changes in the original long-range plan—which called for seven dams and channel improvements—might be required as a result of the 1942 flood.

The revisions will not affect the already-completed Cottage Grove and Fern ridge dams, nor the two dams—Dorena and Detroit—for which construction plans are virtually complete.

SEATTLE, March 3 (AP)—Believed victims of food poisoning, John F. Cartwright, 21, shipyard worker, and his brother, Gael, 23, were found dead in John's apartment here yesterday. Coroner C. L. Harris ordered post-mortem tests to determine the cause of the deaths.

Family Finds Body of Marine Flier

PORTLAND, Ore., March 3 (AP)—A marine flier whose plane was sought vainly by military personnel was found by his family after a four-week hunt through almost impenetrable swampland, a sister said today.

Mrs. E. E. Demars said the body of her brother, 1st Lt. Robert C. Pennington, was located in his plane's wreckage in the North Carolina swamp where he crashed last December 19.

Burtrand and Tracy Pennington, determined their brother's body should be buried, traveled from their home at Townsend, Mont., to North Carolina after military searches failed to find the crashed plane.

With a family friend, they camped in the swamp for four weeks, searching the marshland yard by yard. They traveled half the swamp's length before finding the plane. Military services were held for the dead flier at Cherry Point, N. C.
