## DAMAGE SUIT FILED IN CAR CRASH DEATH

Gust Demetrakos, father of 16-year-old Nick Demetrakos killed September 30, 1944, in an automobile accident on The Dalles-California highway while en route to Klamath Falls from a football game, today filed suit against Charles Perry, father of "Chuck" Perry, alleged driver of the car, seeking \$10,000 damages.

William P. Lord and Ben Anderson, Portland, are attorneys for the plaintiff.

The complaint sets forth that Charles Perry was owner of the car in which young Demetrakos was riding at the time he met his death, and that "Chuck" Perry is a son of the defendant and at the time of the fatal accident was 17 years of age. "Chuck" was also named as driver of the car by the plaintiff.

Demetrakos charged that "Chuck" Perry was operating the car a short distance south of Chemult on Highway 97, and that he drove negligently and with a reckless disregard of the rights of his passengers.

In addition to \$10,000 damages, Demetrakos seeks costs.
