

# WILINGS ON CURFEW SENT TO ALMETER

Further interpretations of the curfew order affecting establishments which are to be closed by 12 o'clock each night are being made to mean as follows: 1. Instruction to instructive, as received by Jack Almeter, just manager for the curfew commission; 2. All persons are to be out of the establishment promptly at midnight, including bartenders, cooks, bus boys, waiters, messengers, and attendants, excepting only such workers as are customarily employed after midnight for protective and maintenance purposes; 3. The serving of alcoholic beverages and the operation of entertainment devices and programs which are to cease at midnight may not be resumed after 7 a. m.; 4. No establishment listed as closed by the curfew order may evade the intent of the order by occupying any part of the building as a means to change the establishment's accepted classification. For example, a club may not close that portion of the building, used for dining and entertainment purposes in order to operate another part of the building as a restaurant; 5. For purposes of the curfew order, a restaurant may be interpreted to mean an establishment whose primary activity is serving of food to the general public without entertainment which may be considered a secondary inducement or attraction to the trade. (This interpretation is not meant to apply to food-serving establishments in which there are the primary coin-operated devices which, in accordance with the curfew order, are to be silenced at midnight.)

# CONTINUING OF UNITED ACTION ASKED

MINNEAPOLIS, March 8 (AP)—Commander Harold Stassen believes the United States should stand with its allies at the San Francisco United Nations conference in April to "build a united continuing organization of the united nations of the world, based on justice and law, insured by force." Stassen also urged, in an address broadcast from the University of Minnesota last night, that "we gradually develop a new higher level of government, with legislative, judicial and executive functions and with worldwide jurisdiction." Failure to reach agreement at San Francisco, he said, would start us on a way along the short road to worldwide decisions and to the next and tragic world war. The former republican governor of Minnesota was making his first public address before he attends the San Francisco meeting as a delegate. He now is on leave from his naval duties in the Pacific.

Nothing, he said, could prevent war in the next 25 years unless the United States, or Russia, or Great Britain decides to make a difference as to whether they can find a way for joint action. The aggressor nations in this world should be stripped, he said, of their remaining tools of war. "We, ourselves, should remain strong" to stand with our allies in furnishing police powers in the world.

## The War At a Glance

By The Associated Press The western front: Movements of converging first and third armies blacked out as linkup, trapping six more nazis divisions, loomed; third breakthrough reached Rhine northwest of Coblenz and first drove on Bonn. The Russian front: Moscow dispatches hinted grand offensive on Berlin began as Germans told of great assault on 100-mile front east of capital; right flank secured for assault by advances in Pomerania and toward Stettin. The Italian front: U. S. troops consolidated gains west of Bologna-Florence highway made in five-mile advance from Monte Belvedere sector. The Pacific front: Marines exploited dents in Japanese last-stand line on northern Iwo; U. S. troops reached southern shores of Luzon for first time; Americans east of Manila edged ahead as air blows softened enemy positions; bombers in China sea sweeps sank or damaged two warships, 16 freighters.
