Parents of the pilot are Mr. and Mrs. Charles F. Kenyon of 1655 Portland.

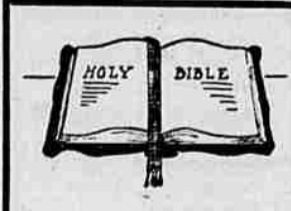

KLAMATH MEN IN GUAM XXI BOMBER COMMAND HEADQUARTERS, GUAM

(Delayed) — Two men from Klamath Falls, Oregon, and vicinity are among the hundreds of enlisted men at a huge Superfortress base in the Marianas whose diligent efforts have made it possible for the giant B-29 bombers of Major General Curtis E. LeMay's XXI bomber command to strike regularly at the heart of Japan's war industry.

They are members of a combat unit commanded by Brigadier General Emmett O'Donnell Jr., who led the first B-29 striking force from Saipan to bomb Tokyo's aviation industry on November 24, 1944.
