## GROUND TRAINING OFFICER ARRIVES

Lt. James F. Hughes, USNR, reported Thursday to the Klamath naval air station from NAS at Pensacola, Fla., where he received aerial free gunnery training. Lt. Hughes spent approximately four months at that base.

Prior to that time, Lt. Hughes was on duty at the advanced base on Saipan, and in the Marshalls, spending 18 months on duty in the Pacific.

Lt. Hughes was assigned to the ground training department of the naval air station here. His home is in Orland, Calif., and prior to entering the service he was an instructor in science and mathematics at Portland high school, Portland, Calif. ## Cut In Cost of FHFA Project Considered

In order to cut down the cost of the FHFA project for construction of 50 portable prefabricated houses in Klamath Falls, Edgar R. Herzog, FHFA project planner for Oregon, stated that his department would immediately begin revising site plans by \$20,000 or \$30,000. Elimination of some of the roads, sidewalks and curbing is planned to consolidate the project.

Only two bids were received for this project, and were tentatively rejected, but if costs can be cut sufficiently, new bids may be considered.

## OWAC to Celebrate Third Birthday With Dinner Party

A birthday dinner will mark the third year of activity in the war effort for the Oregon Women's Ambulance corps the evening of March 20.

An Easter bonnet parade will be a highlight of the Tuesday evening celebration in the Klamath armory. Members will wear hats they have made themselves and prizes will be awarded for style and ingenuity.

Fried chicken will be the piece-de-resistance of the dinner. The committee in charge of the affair includes Sgt. Dorothea Nolan chairman, Cpl. Margaret Mench and Sgt. Eva Lea Long.

The ten members to receive three-year pins for consistent service from the inception of the corps through to the present time are Capt. Edith M. Webb, Cpl. L. Carothers, T/Sgt. Eva Lea Long, Cpl. Margaret Paschal, Sgt. Jonnie Bell, Cpl. Bernice Britt, Cpl. Theima Riley, T/Sgt. Lela Evans, S/Sgt. Betty Costel, Cpl. Edna Cully.

Four more members have been in the corps for two years and six others over a year.

For work during the past six months the corps has won the state plaque which it hopes to keep.

The women's ambulance corps did not dissolve with civilian defense but has continued to work in the war effort. First aid is kept up with a refresher class each Tuesday night. Two classes conducted by Sgt. Mona Dixon have been graduated in the last six months.

The 36 members have devoted 118 hours to ambulance service, 1550 miles have been covered and 39 ambulance calls answered by the group. Competent corps members co-operated in attending casualties in the two bus accidents in this area, receiving commendation of medical authorities for their aid.

PFC Dorothy Davison's first aid administered to T/Sgt. Lee Evans when she was injured in an accident was credited for saving Evans' life. Miss Davison was also commended for materially helping other injured members of the party to recover.

The OWAC sponsors activities for the service men also, including the bowling alley and the concessions for the army dances. They helped at a Christmas dance and at the policemen's ball, and wrapped gift packages for Oak Knoll hospital in Oakland, Calif.

Junior corps members had a rummage sale, and also went Christmas caroling.

The OWAC plans to remain an organized group for the duration. Its latest activity for the war effort is aiding in the Red Cross war fund drive. Members are taking over a section of the city and soliciting donations for the fund.
